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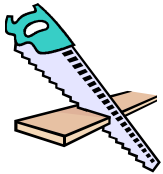

- 1st Place: Erl Poulin won first place with a Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild sign made from a pine 2 x 4 construction grade. It had no finish, and amazingly its point of interest was that he built it the day of the contest! The challenge was to complete it on time. No kidding!
 - Congratulations Erl - A well deserved win
- 2nd Place: David Roth received second place with 3 Monstrances / crosses that come apart for shipping to churches in third world countries. They were made of a pine 2 x 4 finished with Shellac and varnish, and the challenges were the lap joints.

- 3rd Place: Tim Helfrich took third with 3 banks, also made of a pine 2 x 4, with a painted finish. These were originally based on a design for napkin holders, but blown up bigger. One had Christmas Tree lights on it. The challenge included drilling the slots out.

- Bill Webb brought in a candle holder and ring holder made of cherry and oak 2 x 4. The finish was Sedona Red and polyurethane, and the design featured sharp points. The challenge was making them straight.

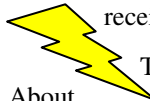

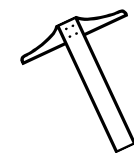

Book Review

Classic Joints - Yeung Chan (available at Woodcraft)



Modern woodworkers rely on machines more than ever before, but the actual joints they use have changed little over the years.

Most woodworking titles continue to show a combination of hand-tool and machine techniques, which does not reflect the way many people really work.

Chan, a furniture maker, designer, and teacher who studied under James Krenov at the College of the Redwoods, shows readers how to create a vast array of wood joints using just machines (though some do require a little handwork).

This title will be useful to woodworkers of all skill levels.

The router table has a base and top with cabinet doors and two drawers and with a 24 inch Incra jig ultra system for accurate measurements when making joints in wood. The fence can be used on the router table or table saw. So it can be more versatile.

The dust collection system would be a Jet Air System that you hang on the ceiling. With a remote control. Model 650.

Russ Amos brought in a Thomas Jefferson lap desk made from fiddleback mahogany veneer and Baltic birch. The finish was shellac and wax. Points of interest included the very thin material. Challenges included cutting the dove-tails and finding the right hardware.

Russ also brought in a sewing machine cover made from Baltic Birch and walnut. The finish was lacquer. Challenge: Getting the curves just right.
