
Jim and Gary passed along their experiences to the Leadership Committee during it's monthly meeting. They told us that the teachers and principals

Wood Shop Housekeeping

Sloppy work conditions can lead to unsafe conditions and a lack of pride in the Guild Shop, or your home shop. Each time you work in the Guild shop or your shop, take a few minutes to clean up after you are done working in the shop.

Problems caused by poor housekeeping include:

- Slips from slick floor areas and walking on sawdust covered floor surfaces.
- Trips from objects or materials that someone left in walkways and work areas.
- Cuts and bruises caused by poorly stored materials, overhanging or protruding objects, haphazard spotting of pallets, and use of aisles for storing equipment and materials in the shop.

Good Housekeeping:

- Eliminates accident or slip and fall causes
- Helps control damage to guild equipment from falling off cluttered benches.
- Encourages safer work habits.

- By cleaning up after each shop session, it reduces the amount of cleanup required.
- Provides the best use of shop space.

Housekeeping is more than just sweeping and cleaning, it is the most critical part of maintaining a safe work environment in the shop. A clean shop is a safe shop!

Joplin Mobile Libraries Service Project

The Guild recently delivered 22 portable libraries on wheels to schools in the Joplin area, so devastated by the tornado. Each library stood 42 inches tall, contained 65 new books and were hand crafted and each painted with a unique design. Hallmark Corporation and Reading Reptile were represented respectively by Mark Spencer and Pete Cowdin. April Roy, a children's librarian from the Kansas City Public Library led the project. Mr. Stinky Feet and Dino O'Dell also made appearances during the presentation to the Joplin schools, to the delight of the students. Jim Stuart, from the Woodworkers Guild noted that this is just the type of community project the Guild enjoys making as part of its mission is to engage in community service projects. It is estimated that the libraries took about 500 hours to build, and used 60 sheets of plywood and 300 board feet of popular.

Note we will be offering six basic woodworking programs for beginning and minimally experienced woodworkers. There will be three projects which can be built, using the skills taught in these programs. First would be a small jewelry box, the second a larger tool box and the last a small table or nightstand. The projects will be mentored by Guild members. The people who complete their projects by at least the December meeting will receive recognition from the Guild. The joinery program will be a "round robin" type, with benches and tool setups around the shop for people to mingle and visit each station to learn more about box and dovetail joints. There are several ways to cut each joint, and we hope to have about 7 to 8 stations, with 10 minute demonstrations repeating about six times.
