

Once again we welcome back Dave Kraatz for another one of his "Fun In The Workshop" presentations and projects. This time we get to see Dave make tapered table legs, a fancy curved table top and drawer fronts with angles and curves. And if we all behave and ask nice, perhaps a bit more mortise and tenon joinery. All of this with his basic tool kit and the aid of power tools common in the home shop and abundant in the Guild Shop! And don't forget that Dave will be hosting a Saturday clinic for those interested in building this table. Be sure and ask Dave lots of questions and make him sweat the details during his presentation. He enjoys the challenge, really, he does.

The month of June brought us the start of hot weather, ear-

ly crop harvests and our annual Open House. We had displays of projects big and small, wood turning demonstrations courtesy of the Kansas City Wood Turners, how to do woodworking with small children (it still puzzles me as to which glue is appropriate for gluing together small children and how much clamp pressure to apply), and demonstrations of dovetailing, project layout, bandsaw box making and more. Jim Stuart also showed off this end-grain cutting board made of Walnut, Maple, Mahogany, and Purple Heart.




John Johnson completed this flag case for a friend. Made of chestnut and finished with Minwax Poly.

from which to start your project. Chuck covered such topics as dealing with wane or bark edges, flattening boards at the jointer, the use of the thickness planer and good technique at the table saw. All topics and techniques you can put into use during Open Shop and with your projects. Our next session will cover the basic steps in preparing a surface for finish including sanding, planing, scraping, managing "blotchy" woods and a bit on fixing the inevitable booboos. After that we have clinics planned on sharpening, finish choices, measuring and marking, wood selection and many more topics.

Marc Waugh is bringing us some good workshops and classes, most recently one with Ken Sokol on the building of oak frame-and-panel blanket chests. This class is under-way but if you are interested in a second offering, go tell Marc and Ken to do it again! And speaking of doing it again, Ron Lomax is going to have another of his "Three Box Classes" starting very soon. If you have a skill or project class in mind, tell us and we will find a place for it in our schedule.

Another recent event at the shop was the construction of a small bench to be installed at the VA Medical Center Honor Annex. The materials for the bench were donated by Meto Hardwoods (a

Triple Box Class Submitted by Mark Waugh


