out the shop expansion this past month, lots of space and plenty of tools. Not completely finished but mostly done. If you see anything that can improve the shop drop me a note. I can always use new ide-88.

This month I'm going to revisit the oldies but goodies that can always bear repeating. Because this is a communal shop we have to be considerate of our fellow members so that we can all enjoy our time here. These are some of the items that make up the Shop Code

Clean up after yourself. Yes, the shop is kept cleaner than your shop at home. Clean as you go and keep an eye on the dust collector bags. The Shop Foremen are volunteers and they didn't volunteer to clean up after you. If we all clean up as we go the shop is always clean for the next guy.

Use your Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). Stay safe with safety glasses, facemasks, hearing protection, sensible footwear and clothing. Remember - no gloves, earbuds (music, phone etc.) or talking on All wood is not equal. Due to the effects on

with your shoes on when the day is done.

Don't leave your project out on the tables or stuck in a corner. If you don't have storage space in the back, you need to take your project with you. There are a couple of exceptions, if you can utilize the lockers then you can keep your stuff there, or if you are working at the end of the day and are glued up AND (that's a big and) you are coming back at the beginning of the next Open Shop (assuming there is not a meeting or class in between) you can leave your well identified project out on the bench. If you don't come back, there is no promise that things will be as you left them.

Our shop is a space equipped with tools. If the tools need servicing, that is broken, tell the shop foreman so that we can get everything back up and running. Hand tools that need to be sharpened? Sharpen them! If you don't feel confident of your sharpening skills, ask the Foreman to help get you started. Put the planes and chisels back

hope you have had a chance to check Safe, enjoy woodworking and count to ten all wood to be used in the shop. Pressure treated wood, green (non dry) wood, painted/finished wood and barn wood is not to be used in the shop. Reclaimed lumber is allowable but must be scrubbed clean and scanned for tramp metal (nails, screws, horseshoes etc.). Repair costs for damage to tools from embedded wood will be your responsibility.

> Finishing is the one step that cannot be done at the shop. Because of the risk of exposure to our members of the various chemicals used in finishing we do not allow finishing of member projects at the shop. sorry that includes spray, brush, pad finishes, stains, oils, magic elixirs etc.
