From the Shop

t's hot, good time to get into the shop and work on some projects, the yard can wait! Hope everyone had a good 4th of July.

News around the shop: the Parks bandsaw is up and running with new tires and blade ouides so we now have two bandsaws for resawing. This brings up the issue of Sawing Logs. Sawing logs are tricky because trees refuse to grow with one flat surface so they will remain supported as they are cut. Whether you are cutting cookies (because apparently that is the number one wedding motif in the world at this time) or resawing a log, keeping the log steady and secure is your biggest issue. Logs need to be held on a sled of some sort that can cradle the log and not allow it to move during cutting. Trees also don't tend to remain consistent diameter over their length so make sure that the log will fit under the auide for its entire length.

For the record, the Guild discourages the sawing of logs in the shop.

The unstableness mentioned above is the First reason.

- trees arow outside. The bark of these outside trees tends to contain a lot of dirt and orit. Our sawblades don't cut dirt and grit for long before they become dull and don't cut as well, \$38 blade cone.
- Third reason is that trees have a habit of hiding metal inside of them that only becomes apparent once a sharp cutting edge finds them, goodbye blade again.
- Fourth reason pertains to green wood. Cutting green wood requires a larger qullet on the tooth because the sawdust produced is fluffier (not a USDA approved term). Overloading the gullet results in blade wandering and excess heat and strain on the blade. As an added bonus green wet wood

will most likely trip the SawStop tablesaws and make you sad.

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Second reason is that it turns out most On a happier note the new Grizzly widebelt sander is getting closer to operation with only another 200 more trips to Home Depot for fittings and stuff to go. This widebelt will replace the Performax Drum Sander. I feel that the widebelt is more robust and able to withstand our shop use better than the more fracile drum sander.

> So get out of the heat, come down to the shop, the chips are fine.

Financial Update

he Guild is having another successful year. At the end of June, the bank balance have increased \$19,000 when compared to the beginning of the year. The increase is due in large part to increases in membership and funds from the Woodcarvers organization when they joined the Guild.

We have also completed an expansion of the shop. The expansion was started last December with the purchase of a 16" jointer, a 20" planer, five layout tables, an Oneida dust collector and a vinyl curtain to protect equipment, and the chairs used for meetings and to improve the look of the shop. This year the expansion was completed with the purchase of two additional SawStops and another Oneida dust collector. We also replaced the membership computer and the handheld wireless microphone system. The last piece of equipment purchased was a 24" widebelt sander. The expansion and addi-

tional equipment total over \$30,000.

If you have not seen the shop with all the new gear you need to stop by. It's impressive. I'm sure you will approve on how your money is beginning spent. You might also thank the individuals who volunteered to assemble, hooked up and get the equipment running.

The remainder of the year looks promising. There are a number of fund raising projects coming up that will require your help. The auction will also be an opportunity to volunteer and participate by bidding at the auction. It's events like these that keep the dues low. Make sure you do your part.

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Are You Aware of the "Invisible Injury?"

can also occur if your ears aren't protected.

Loss can occur regardless of the amount of time your ears are exposed to high noise levels -- even if only for a few minutes. Hearing loss is cumulative over your lifetime. A little exposure to very loud noises here and there adds up. And over a lifetime, even a few hours a week in a home shop, your recreational or work related activities can lead to some type of permanent hearing loss.

OSHA considers noise levels below 85 decibels (dB) to be safe. Anyone experiencing noise levels over 85 dB for *any* length of time should use some type of hearing protection. For an article.
