November Program - American Walnut

When you enter the KCWG building you see the awesome counter top made from a thick slab of highly figured walnut. This is pretty typical of the kind of walnut that our November speaker, Mark Schmidlein, gets to deal with at American Walnut located near the old stockyards area in Saint Joseph, Missouri. American Walnut has been around since 1889 and as the Forester at Fort Leavenworth, I often dealt with them through timber sales.

Although they no longer use the

large veneer slicing mill, they do still produce outstanding gun stock blanks, lumber, and thick slabs,



much of which they dry in their huge kilns. Mark can tell us about the history of American Walnut as well as inform us about what they

are doing today. They deal with an international market and we are so fortunate to be located near one of the premier walnut mills in the United States.

Safely Working Around Wood Dust

One hazard to a woodworker that is often overlooked comes from [wood dust](#). This small nuisance is often overlooked as a hazard in the shop. Wood dust particles are like noise exposure; they can cause the most damage over time to your body. Wood dust can affect you in the following ways as an:

Irritant: The most common way that wood dust affects a woodworker is by being a primary irritant. This means that dust can irritate your skin, eyes, and lungs through exposure to the dust. Immediate visible reactions are sneezing, coughing, runny nose, rashes, and asthma-like breathing problems.

Sensitizer: Beyond being an irritating nuisance, some woods can make you increasingly more sensitive with each successive exposure. So even if you don't experience any allergic reaction to the wood or its dust upon first exposure, each time you breathe the dust or handle the wood, you become more sensitized to that spe-

cies of wood dust. Sometimes the reaction can be quite dramatic, resulting in rashes, severe sinus or respiratory pain/inflammation, or a number of other conditions depending on the wood species.

Toxin: This is not as common, but some woods are considered toxic. One example of this is Yew, which according to ancient Roman knowledge, was capable causing fatality in certain cases.

Carcinogen: If you look at this hyperlink to a [toxicity chart](#) of wood species, it identifies the woods that are toxic.

The Ways that you can minimize the wood dust risk is to reduce your exposure by implementing three basic controls in the shop.

Always use personal protective equipment (dust masks, respirators, powered purifying respirators, etc).

Use a dust collector for all fixed and portable tools or a down draft table when

sanding.

Use a ceiling-mounted air filter to collect airborne dust particles that are suspended in the air.

Dust cannot be avoided in a woodworking shop, but it can be managed. By recognizing the hazard, implementing the appropriate controls, the effects of dust on your body can be managed for a safer and more enjoyable time in the shop.
