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January 18 Program Eye Health/Protecting Our Eyes While Working With Wood With Dr. Miranda Bishara

We are pleased to present Dr. Bishara, Assistant Professor at the University of Kansas Department of Ophthalmology, or KU Eye Center. Dr. Bishara specializes in cataracts, cornea, and refractive surgery.

Since 2012, Dr. Bishara has been co-head ophthalmologist for both the Kansas City Chiefs and Kansas City Royals teams.

Passionate about helping those in need, Dr. Bishara served on medical mission trips to Ecuador and Peru during her residency and fellowship, and continues to seek opportunities to provide surgical eye care to underserved populations. Locally, she is active in education and promoting vision care, through the free JayDoc clinics and as a member of the KU Eye Lions Club, which offers quarterly free clinics and surgeries.

I have two experiences which should help convince you and me to protect our eyes whenever we are in the shop, whether at the Guild or at home or at a neighbor's shop.

First, one of my wife's uncles was a carpenter (actually several of the uncles were carpenters). While working at the table saw many years ago, a chunk of wood flew up at struck him in the head in a way as to injure his eye and cause him to lose sight in that eye. (I have sent many a small piece of wood flying on the cross-cut saw while using the sled.) Surely a good pair of protective lenses would have protected his eye sight.

In the second case, a neighbor was helping clean up in the church kitchen when someone dropped a wine glass on the floor. When it broke, a shard of glass penetrated his eye and he spent plenty of time in the VA Hospital in Leavenworth healing that wound. I was surprised that a shard of glass could be propelled from the floor to strike him in the eye from that distance.

Obviously, no one is going to be wearing special glasses while working around the kitchen, but the point is that even if you are not the cause of the object being thrown, that object can still do you damage. That is why there is the rule that you will wear protective lenses for your eyes at all times in the shop and that you should do the same at home or whenever you are near equipment even if it at your neighbor's house.

The protective lenses that my wife bought for us to use in the shop cost less than \$10 each while my prescription frames alone cost \$400 plus another \$300 for the prescription lenses. If nothing else, the cheap ones are good protection for the expensive ones and they have added protection from the sides.

2017 is shaping Up to be a Banner Training Year for Our Guild

I am very pleased that **Norm Carpenter** has volunteered to be Assistant Training Director for our Guild. Norm is an accomplished woodworker, instructor and eager planner of classes. Please meet him and thank him for his assistance.

I am posing some ponderous New Year questions for Guild members of all levels of experience from beginning to advanced craftsmen.

• Where can you get access to an extensively equipped shop like ours to practice and hone your woodworking skills for the cost our membership?

- Where can you meet and associate with 700+ woodworkers of all experiences on a regular basis?
- Where can you meet and build you experience with more seasoned mentor woodworkers?
- Where can you practice with a more extensive safety program and practice?
- Where can you have the opportunity to get training classes at an affordable price, some with nationally known woodworkers and many from very skilled member craftsmen?

The Answer is very simple, the Kansas City Woodworkers Guild.

This year we are planning <u>a full range of classes and associated training opportunities</u> for members of the Guild.

If you are a new member or a sojourner from high school shop class or even a sometime maker, we offer the **Basic Woodworking Class**, which is a progressive 10 week class that will give you 30 hours of instruction on the basic operations of woodworking. You will build three projects that lead you in hands on experience with the major machines in our shop. You will also qualify for your Green card to allow you member shop privileges.

We offer monthly **Skill Builder Sessions** conducted by our members. These sessions are generally conducted on the first Saturday of each month and present a technique or process of woodworking. We have presented Mortise and Tenon joinery, re sawing on the band saw, band sawn boxes, dowel joinery, pocket screw joinery, basic cabinet making, using the dado saw, using the router table and hand cut dovetails to recall some recent ones. We will rerun some of these and we will stage new ones as the year progresses. The classes usually do not require a Green card and are open to all members.

We have scheduled two **Expert Level Classes** with nationally known woodworkers. In April, we will host **David Abeel**, a Michigan **Windsor Chair** maker. David's class will present the opportunity to make a stool, a side chair, an arm chair, a rocking chair or a settee. This is an excellent class for the beginner and seasoned woodworker alike to learn this ageless craft. David has conducted many classes. His biography and class description is listed on our web site. His class is currently open for enrollment.

In October, we will again host **Paul Schurch** for a class on making a marquetry jewelry box. If you ever hope or dream of learning this woodworking art, Paul Schurch's class is a rare opportunity to learn from an internationally known master. Paul's skill as an instructor will build your skill and experience quickly.



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In addition to these classes, we are planning a series of **mentored project classes** on intermediate level woodworking projects lead by several of our experienced members. These classes will be for six to ten students and meet over three to five class sessions to build a small piece of furniture like a table, chair, bench, display cabinet or chest that emphasizes a typical style or technique of woodworking. One of these classes will be scheduled in June with **Cal Hobbs** to lead us in making a hall table of walnut. This class will present a mix of traditional hand tool and basic machine tool operations to teach the process of build a piece of furniture.

As you can see, 2017 is shaping up to be a banner year for training. We do need your help to guide us in presenting offerings that meet your woodworking needs. We would like for every visit to the Guild to be a lesson in woodworking.

Skill Builder Classes – A Great Addition to the Program

On January 7^{th,} The Guild hosted another in its running series of Skill Builder classes, when Marselle Bredemeyer demonstrated hand-crafted half-blind dovetails. About 24 people showed up and we were all enthralled by how quickly she was able to, not only create a 3-pin halfblind dovetail joint, but at the same time explain how to perform the actions needed. Marselle did an excellent job at explaining that halfblind dovetails aren't scary, just need a bit of chisel work.

When it was over, participants said that she did such a good job with the class that they were looking forward to what she might offer next.



The Guild offers these monthly skill building classes to present individual aspects of the woodworking craft to *members* who need to expand their skills in discrete areas. The classes are listed on the Guild's <u>website</u> and announced regularly through the Guild's email service. The classes are free and require no **Green Name Tags** or SignUps. You just show up and learn.

Other classes currently scheduled include:

February 4th – **Cutting Mortise and Tenons** – Instructor: Tim Locke – 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. March 4th – **Door Making** – Instructor: Roland Mohler – 2:00 – 4:00 p.m.

SKILL SHARPENING AND CAMARADERIE

It's been turf box season at the Guild again. This month we made 100 of the Briefcase boxes for Field Turf.

Participation in group fund-raising projects such as this is a good way to practice using a piece of machinery or sharpen a skill, as they are generally done in batches, so you get lots of repetitions. For example, in this project we used the chop saw, jointer, planer, table saw,

drill press, hand-held router, router table, dado saw, pneumatic nailer, orbital sander and horizontal belt sander. There was hand sanding, filling nail holes, and application of Danish oil, so even those without green badges have had a place to help out.

Besides that, it's a lot of fun working together with others for a common goal. I like meeting new members or people who don't normally come to the shop when I'm there. It's a good time to chat (while you're working, of course) and find out you have common interests or that maybe you only live a few minutes apart.



Yet another perk for helping with these projects, besides keeping the annual dues low, is that you earn "guild shares" for each hour you put in. These shares can be used for purchasing guild merchandise, paying for classes, or applying to your annual dues.

We appreciate those who came out to make the turf boxes, even on snowy days!

From the Shop

This the start of a new year and there are a lot of important changes going on in the shop. Most importantly is **a new safety rule**, which rule is the result of observations and discussion by the Safety Committee while working on the new Safety Handbook. And the new rule is this; "Safety Glasses will be worn at all times during Open Shop times while you are in the shop". Because work is taking place throughout the shop, there is no place devoid of risk from airborne debris. I know that this rule is a big change and everybody hates change, but, these are the rules, and our goal is to keep the shop a safe place even with more members using the shop. I look forward to your cooperation.

While we're on the subject of safety glasses. Safety Glasses are made with impact rated lenses and side shields. They are not your regular glasses. They are not your regular glasses with snap on side shields. If you wear prescription glasses you know if you ordered safety glasses, because you had to special order them.

The foremen will make gentle reminders through January, but come February you will not be allowed to work in the shop without them.

The shop will be seeing some **improvements in the near future**. Improvements include some new dust collectors, a water-cooled spindle for the CNC Router (CNC Spindle?) and some new dust



collector controls. These additions will help in lowering the ambient noise level in the shop long with providing better air quality and a cleaner shop.

A new resaw bandsaw is also in the works and the addition of a third router table.

The last change I will mention is **Thursday Evening**. Thursday evenings will now be exclusively Training Session Nights reserved for classes and other training activities that our Director of Training may schedule. As a result, Kevin Thomas is moving his Open Shop shift to the 4th Wednesday from 6-9pm.

The shop is a busy place, but with your cooperation I see our workshop also getting better.

2016 a Strong Year Financially

The Guild had a very busy and financially successful 2016. We continue to maintain our sound financial position with a bank balance of \$153,637 at year end. With a lot of volunteer help and hard work the Guilds financial reserve increased by \$37,636 when compared to the beginning of the year. The increase includes a \$10,478 contribution from the Wood Carvers when they joined our organization.

Monthly cash flow statements are available on the Guild web site in the "Members Only" section under "Financial Statements". The Treasurer will also be providing a financial update at the January 18th general meeting.

The Guild purchased over \$18,000 in new equipment during 2016. The purchases include two Saw Stop table saws, an Oneida dust collector, a 24" wide belt sander, improved audio equipment for uses during Guild meetings and ten replacement vices and other equipment. The shop expansion which was started in 2015 is now complete but equipment replacement and improvements are in the works for 2017.

Membership renewal is underway. There is a \$5.00 discount if you renew before February 1st. If you do not renew your membership before April 1st you will need to retake the safety test and orientation to regain your **Green Tag** and shop privileges. Your level of membership must be a "Sawdust Maker" or above and your safety orientation must be current to use shop equipment.

You can renew your membership by coming to the Guild to make a payment. Checks, cash or credit cards can be used. You can mail in the renewal using a check or you can go to the Guild web site and renew online using PayPal.

If you're interested in becoming more familiar with Guild finances or membership; help is always welcome. Please see me if you would like to volunteer your help.

Focus on Safety...

As I stated in last month's Newsletter, our new comprehensive *Safety Rules for the KCWG Shop* handbook, in development by **Bob Edsall**'s Safety Sub-Committee, is being finalized for rollout in early 2017 and will replace the existing machine-only safety rule sheets. Let me restate just one of the *shop-wide* rules that warrants more emphasis and has been strengthened in the new handbook:

Wear safety glasses with side shields when the shop is in operation, wherever you are working, not just when you are using a machine yourself. Glasses should be ANSI Z87.1 rated.

In the U.S., approximately <u>2.5 million people injure their eyes every year</u>, mostly in industrial settings, like our Shop. The American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) has stated that 90% of these eye injuries could have been prevented if the injured person had been using safety eyewear. Safety glasses can prevent minor eye injuries, such as retinal detachments and corneal abrasions, as well as major traumatic injuries, such as internal eye bleeding and permanent blindness. All it takes is one mishap, even on a machine someone else is using – an exploding grinding wheel or a wood fragment thrown by a table saw or router – to possibly change your life forever.

A few suggested sources for the specified safety eyewear are:

- Prescription (RX-Safety.com or Safevision.net)
- Non-prescription (USSafety.com)
- Reader magnifications (Amazon.com)
- Goggles
- Plastic safety glasses (KCWG)

Be smart. Follow the rules. Respect the Shop Foremen and others who occasionally remind you of the rules that are meant to protect you; and thanks for your continued Focus on Safety!
