

You may have learned how to make a cutting board, one or more of 4 types of presentation boxes, a new fancy knife, a shop stool, two different kinds of bandsaw boxes, a carved bird, an animal puzzle, a spice box, a workbench, an Arts & Crafts Table, or added some Inlay to a favorite project. Chandler. If you have taken Beginning Woodworking recently you know Rick for the assistance he gives that class. Rick will be taking over Roland's Tuesday evening timeslot while Roland, with a desire to work days, adds to the Wednesday daytime

Shop time. Now adding 3 hours to the 2nd and 4th (and 5th) Wednesdays following Bob Caldwell's morning timeslot.

Have I ever mentioned how enjoyable it is to work with hardwood? I know, I know, soft wood like Pine, Cedar, Spruce and Douglas Fir is less expensive and has so many great features missing in our hardwood. The way the pitch gums up saw blades and sanding belts is unmatched. Chisels with a bevel suitable for hardwood tends to crush rather than cut, resulting in a less crisp mortise. Since construction lumber is held to a higher moisture content (drying costs money) you get to joint your boards over and over as they continue to dry. A project is not finished until you finish it. Nothing

takes stain the way softwood does (except maybe birch) and what's the point of learning all these finishing techniques if you don't get to use them to avoid blotchy stain.

SAFETY RULES - THE FOUNDATION OF YOUR **SAFETY AT THE GUILD**

Every football team has "money" plays that they go to again and again. Every player on every team knows their role in those plays like the back of their hand. Much like that, our Safety Rules are intended to be studied and executed correctly again and again by our Green Name Badge members. Most of those rules we know by heart and through countless executions, but the rest of them deserve your review from time to time.

Our current version of the Safety Rules was developed through a lot of hard work and a lot of iterations by your Safety Committee. The rules are a distillation of many years' worth of refinement, based on best practices in the field of woodworking and our members' collective experience. The final product, along with corresponding online Safety Test, was transitioned to in June 2017. Bob Edsall, Jerry Stanley and Denny Sondgeroth were our coordinators of this very significant project. Many hours of thankless edits and

revisions resulted in the version that we have today.

Just like any organization's documentation, these Rules are only useful in fulfilling their intended purpose, if we use them. They're available to you anytime you're in the Shop and have a question about the safe operation of any given machine, as well as hand tools and handheld power tools. There are three laminated and spiral-bound copies hanging between the front two SawStop table saws, over the scrap bins and over the sanding table in the Bench Room. Additionally, there's an enlarged version, framed page-by-page and perusable, over the scrap bin, as well.

In the next few months, we plan to start producing a short video of each machine's most critical Safety Rules being demonstrated described. These videos are intended to eventually be available for viewing on the KCWG website, as well as providing a couple of minutes of Safety Focus at some of our KCWG General

They Meeting sessions. could most certainly be incorporated into our Safety Orientation classes, as well.

Nothing says thank you to the Safety Committee like you taking the time to use this valuable resource to ensure that you do things as safely as possible in our Shop! Know the Rules! Follow the Rules! They are not negotiable or optional at the Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild. (It's like the old comedy album, The First Family, in which Bobby Kennedy asks Jack Kennedy about rules' violations during a White House touch football game. President Kennedy's response is, "When you play here, you play by my rules, or you don't play at all. Why? Because it's my ball, that's why!")

SAFETY BULLETIN

Lye safety is one of the highest priorities within the guild's shops. The rule on eye safety is this; "Approved Safety Glasses will be worn at all times during Open Shop periods."

Because work is taking place throughout the shop, there is no place devoid of risk from airborne debris. Our goal is to keep the shop a safe place to work and preserve an environment where we are all safe. We look forward to your cooperation.

Wear safety glasses with side shields when the shop is in operation, wherever you are in the shop and not just when you are using a machine. Glasses must be ANSI Z87.1 rated and be stamped as such.

They are not your regular glasses. They are not your regular glasses with snap on side shields. If you wear prescription glasses you know if you ordered safety glasses, because you had to special order them.

A few suggested sources for the specified safety eyewear are: Prescription (RX-Safety.com or any of the Phillips Safety websites). These websites offer a 25% discount to members of the guild. Non-prescription safety glasses are also available through Phillips Safety.

The foremen will offer gentle reminders although you will not be allowed to work in the shop without officially rated safety glasses.


BOOKS I'VE READ THIS SUMMER


read just about any book on finishing I can find.
Here are some I like:

One of my favorites is Foolproof Wood Finishing—For Those Who Love to Build and Hate to Finish by Teri Masaschi. This book is a great introduction to basic and intermediate finishing techniques. Ms. Masaschi's




instructions are concise and understandable even for the inexperienced. She describes "the Finish" as surface preparation to final rubout. This is the book which I use as a basis for the finishing class I teach at Woodcraft and at the Guild.

The Art of Coloring Wood. A Woodworker's Guide to Understanding Dyes and Chemicals by Brian Miller and Marci Crestani with excellent photography Marc Carter.. This book is an



advanced finishing instruction book focused primarily on coloring wood with dyes and chemicals instead of stains. Some of the chemicals presented are carcinogens, so extreme caution is required. The coloring techniques can offer dramatic changes in the look of the wood. Large photos of six of the most popular woods used by woodworkers show the effects of the chemicals and dyes. This book will help you put some "pop" into your next project.

If like you to read the origin story of giants of their craft, George Frank's Rue Charonne— Adventures Wood in Finishing is just that book of a master of wood finishing. Mr. Frank



emigrated to France from Hungary in 1924 and began his quest for work in finishing and refinishing in Paris. He describes the mentors and terrors he had through the years and shares many of the techniques that would be lost if not for the writings of books like this.




