Changes to Membership Dues for 2019

There is an increase in dues for 2019 for those members who use the shop. Here is the new dues structure:

 This represents a \$25.00 annual increase for Benefactor and Woodworker Plus, a \$20.00

- We will maintain the 20% discount on Guild classes and merchandise for WW+ and Benefactor members.
- We will continue the \$5.00 discount for renewals between December 1, 2018 and January 31, 2019.

There is one more significant change – the renewal period is being shortened this year. To maintain your membership and Green card status you must renew by February 28, 2019. After February 28th, you will be considered a new member and will need to re-qualify for your Green Badge.

CNC UPDATE

Great News! The CNC will be back in the shop for the Wednesday January 23rd CNC SIG meeting. The meeting will start at 6:00 PM. There will be a presentation on the operation of the upgraded CNC, followed by demonstrations. The number of demonstrations will depend on the number of members that show up.

The presentation and demonstration will not cover the programing or operation of the Vectric software VCarve or Aspire. To get the most out of this meeting the member should be proficient in the creation and preview of a toolpath.

Creating a project using the CNC will be divided into two steps. Step one is programing the software (VCarve or Aspire) to create the toolpath needed. The programing will be done in the Guild library or at home. MakerSpace will be used to create the toolpath in the library if the project was created at home. The toolpath will be placed on a flash drive and that will be taken to the CNC room.

Step two the flash drive will be uploaded to the CNC and run.

The procedure to upload and run the CNC will be the main topic for the January 23rd meeting.

The reason for dividing the programing from running the CNC is to allow more than one member to create a project while another is using the CNC. It will decrease congestion in the CNC room.

We will also set up a schedule to insure everyone is trained on operating the CNC before they can use it.

TREASURER'S REPORT

FINANCIAL UPDATE

The financial books for 2018 are closed and the planning for 2019 is well on its way. The Guild ended the year in a financially sound position. Net assets total over \$100 thousand in cash and CD's.

you're interested in detail that's o n the website in the "Members Only" sec-The tion. section contains monthly financial activity. financial vear-end statements. financial audit by a CPA firm of the 2017 records and reporting. Please review any or all the material and bring questions me individually or at the next membership meeting.

During the year the Guild upgraded the electrical system by increasing the amount of power coming into the shop. New dust collection duct work was also installed,

and a new drill press was purchased. We also spent a great deal of effort in training and keeping the shop open and equipment running.

On the challenging side, our turf box customer has become less reliable. Revenue is way down for the vear and there are indications it will not come back. To make up for the lost revenue and to insure the Guild financially remains sound membership fees were increased for 2019. This the first increase in membership fees since the Guild moved to the present location eight years ago.

Hope you all had a Happy New Year and let's have an even better 2019.





MY GOAL FOR 2019: ABS

Guild! The start of a year is a common time to reflect. Looking back on 2018 I am pleased with what we accomplished have the training team. At the beginning of 2018, I set a goal of having 50 classes available in the guild for 2019. Thanks to a lot of dedicated, talented, and volunteers. caring we that exceeded number and ended up offering 65 classes providing learning opportunities 520 to students. We will need to see what 2019 brings. I like last year's numbers, space and and shop usage may be difficult for us to increase the number of classes that we offer. But if we can find a way, we will continue to look for more ways to teach woodworking.

Last year I remember one of our guild colleagues saying that their goal for the new year was to create plans for everything that he was going to build. He figured that if he could draw it, he could build it. I was also reading the Mike Pekovich book The Why &

Happy New Year to the **How of Woodworking:** A Simple Approach to Making Meaningful **Work** and in this book, he talks about always sketching He designs. does thumbnail sketches and will start with a shape. a rectangle for example, and then add and adjust elements to the shape until he finds a design that appeals. Think of all the wood that he saved just be trying a project on pencil and paper first rather than building in wood.

> I found that the same was true for me when drawing out design plans. I like to use Sketchup when I start a new project. I cannot remember how manu times I had a rail too short or a top too wide. All fixed in the drawing. even before I cut a board. It has saved me quite a bit of time, money, and frustration.

> Personal goals for 2019 will be to improve mυ understanding of Sketchup and to start making thumbnail design sketches to see if I can

come up with some new pieces that I will be happy looking at every day in my home. My mantra for this year is going to be **ABS**: Always Be Sketching.

To tie all this back into my post about training, classes for 2019, and adding to our class experience, we are looking for someone who is comfortable in Sketchup and feels that they can share that knowledge with some fellow woodworkers. The class would be for people that have never used Sketchup or those that have tried and left frustrated with the experience. Please let me know if you think that this is something you could offer the guild.



JANUARY 2019-SAFETY REVIEW-THE HAND HELD ROUTER ROUTEY

A router is basically a motor that turns a cutter head at very high speed. It is used to perform an extensive range of smooth finishing and decorative cuts.

Safety Rules

- Use sharp bits, inspect them before each use, and handle them with care. Never use dull or damaged bits or bits with cracked carbide.
- Consult a speed chart for the correct speed setting for the bit.
- 3. Use only bits that have a cutting diameter less than the opening in the router base.



- 4. Unplug the router when changing a bit.
- 5. When changing a router bit, insert the new bit as far into the collet as possible, then withdraw it about 3/16" before tightening the collet. Make sure that the bit shaft is engaged in the collet at least ½".
- 6. Always use the wrenches provided with the tool to make adjustments.
- Be sure that the collet nut and any other adjustment devices are securely tightened before turning the router on. Loose adjustment devices can unexpectedly shift, causing loss of control; loose bits and collets may be thrown violently.
- 8. Make sure the work surface is free from nails, knots, and other foreign objects. Do not shape particleboard; it could fly apart while being routed.
- 9. Hold the workpiece securely in a vise or other clamping device. Holding the workpiece by hand is unstable and dangerous.
- 10. Follow the tool manufacturer's recommendation for the depth of cut.
- 11. Hold the router firmly with both hands. Motor torque can cause it to twist.
- 12. Feed the cut against the direction of bit rotation. Feeding the tool in the wrong direction causes the cutting edge of the bit to climb out of the workpiece and may cause loss of control.
- 13. Never lay the tool down until the motor and bit have come to a complete stop. The spinning bit can grab a surface and pull the tool out of your control.
- 14. Don't touch the bit immediately after use. It may be hot.
- 15. Return the bit to the bit holder located in the tool cabinet after use. Never store bits loose in a drawer.
