Lots going on between now and the end of the year. If you can step up and assist, we can find you a position you will enjoy.

November is your last chance to make 2020 budget recommendations or suggestions. Our intent is to complete the 2020 budget in early December. The Guild is having a very good year and we look forward to 2020.

One of our major objectives for 2020 is to negotiate an extension to our lease. The current lease is up in May of 2021 and we don't want to wait until the last minute to get an extension.

Membership renewal will start November 20th. For current members, there is a \$5.00 early renewal discount if you renew before the end of January. Membership renewal ends February 29th. Current members who have not renewed by the end of February are dropped from the membership list, which mean there are no renewals after February 29th. All new members and expired members rejoining the guild are required to take the safety test and orientation before they have shop privileges.

If you are renting wood storage space in the back room don't forget your rent for 2020 in most cases is due January 1. I will post a list with names, rental space location and monthly rates at the front desk. When you pay, complete the rental agreement and remove the bottom portion and tape it on your storage space.

The next big event is the Holiday Dinner on December 18th. The cost is \$15 per person. You can sign-up by going to our web site. Please register early. We need an accurate head count for the caterer This is a family event so bring a guest. If you have not attended in the past, the food is good and so is the company.

“I’M A FORESTER” retired



“I’m a forester - retired - but I still have an interest in trees and wood. Just like everyone else, I also love Christmas trees. Throw in a strong connection with the Forests of the Pacific Northwest and you may get an idea of what our program is going to be for November -our last regular meeting before Christmas. Except it’s not about ordinary Christmas trees, but about the gigantic, special tree for Kansas City’s Crown Center. The tree comes from Oregon and was recently trucked to Kansas City where it was erected and decorated for the holidays. It really gets interesting when you visit with one of the persons who erected the tree. There are details on top of and underneath the details, like the fact that the tree sits in a recess just over the underground parking garage. It took a crew of eight workers and a couple of cranes more than 66 hours - most of them in 12-16-hour days just to erect it. The details in how it is put together are fascinating and I’ll bet that you have never been privileged to talk with someone totally involved with the Crown Center tree. I’m not saying that this is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, but I’ll bet that it is since we may not have this point of access in the future. Be there and be amazed!”

“By the way, as the program director I was able to rely on the Special Interest section of the Kansas City Star for articles about woodworkers. That is, until they basically eliminated that section. Many of you often gave me those articles and I used them to make great contacts for programs. I am going to have to work a lot harder to discover ideas for interesting programs without the assistance of the Star. Obviously, I’m also open to your suggestions. Remember that generally the demonstration of specific skills or techniques is the provenance of the Saturday skill builder classes where we can devote two hours to each presentation. The monthly programs are poorly adapted to that type of presentation, although we have tried a few. So, let me know if you know of persons or families doing interesting woodworking in the region. You might be surprised that some of them really don’t want to talk in front of a group of woodworkers. I have been turned down by several, but give me the opportunity to visit with them and invite them. I’m looking forward to another good year of programs, especially with your help. Thanks.”

In that recent email from Mary, she made this comment: *"I'm so sorry that I have not gotten back, but my schedule has been pretty crazy. I'm currently teaching at the Oregon Guild of Woodworkers (who told me they based their guild off of yours)."*

Who knew? Here we are, a bunch of women and men who enjoy woodworking and learning about woodworking and talking about woodworking and we are impacting other groups across the country and influencing woodworking in America.

I don't think that anybody started out to do that. I don't even think that anyone is really thinking about being a woodworking role model today. We just keep looking at how we are doing, what

works and what doesn't, and what more we can offer that makes the Kansas City Woodworkers Guild a better organization.

A Basic Hands-on Introduction to Woodworking

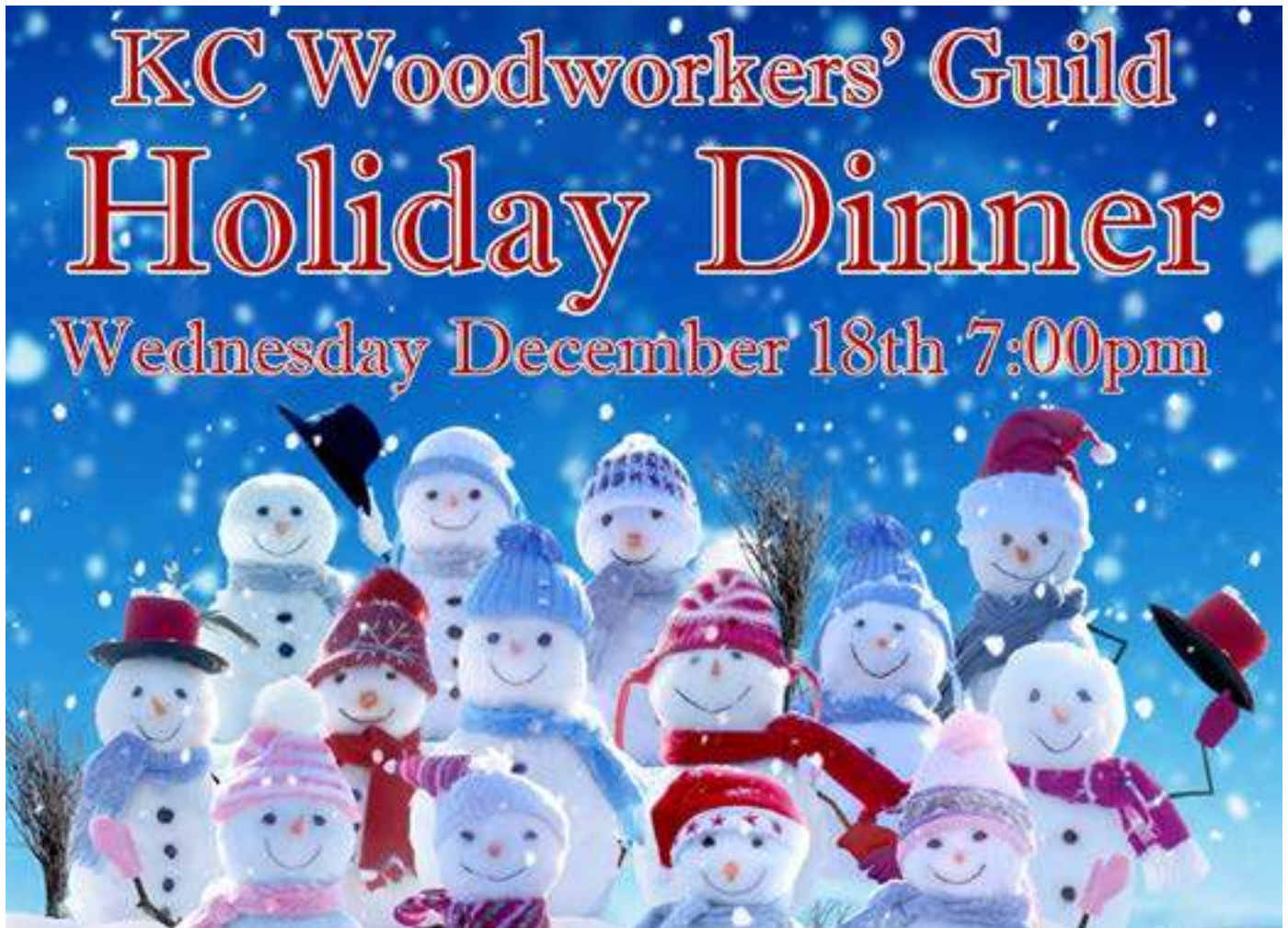

This is the perfect one-on-one or one-on-two class for beginners, novices, even as a refresher for experienced woodworkers to build a 9in x 5in x 3 1/2in lidded box with an experienced instructor. Beginning with rough cut lumber your class will progress step by step to create a lidded box, glued up and ready to take home and apply finish after only minor sanding.



All that's required to take the Rough to Ready class is a paid up Sawdust Maker, Woodworker Plus or Benefactor Membership, a completed and passed Online Safety Test (90% passing grade) and your paid tuition for the class. NOVEMBER SAFETY REVIEW

Lathe

The lathe rotates a workpiece about an axis to permit shaping, sanding, and other operations. Lathes are used to create a wide variety of things, from pens to bowls and more.



Safety Rules

1. Select stock carefully and inspect it closely before undertaking a project. Avoid using wood with knots or splits.
2. Rough out your workpiece with a band saw before mounting it on the lathe.
3. When using the lathe, you must wear a full face shield *in addition to* your safety glasses with side shields.
4. Snug the tailstock center against the work and lock it. Lubricate the tailstock center if it is not a ball-bearing center.
5. Position the tool rest a little below center of the workpiece and no further than 1/8" from it. Stop the lathe periodically as you work to adjust the rest as the workpiece diameter decreases.
6. With the workpiece held in the lathe, rotate it by hand to be sure that it clears the tool rest.
7. Never adjust the position of the tool rest while the lathe is running.
8. Before turning on the power to the lathe, make sure the lathe is set to the lowest possible speed and that the stock is secure. Stand to the side of the machine on the initial start-up in case the workpiece flies off the lathe as it gets up to speed.
9. Keep tools off the lathe bed. Keep the woodturning tools on your side of the lathe so you don't have to reach over the workpiece for them.
10. Keep the woodturning tools sharp. A dull chisel requires excessive feed pressure.
11. Hold the turning chisel firmly and brace it securely against the tool rest.
12. Make contact with the work cautiously, and then slowly make the cut more aggressive.

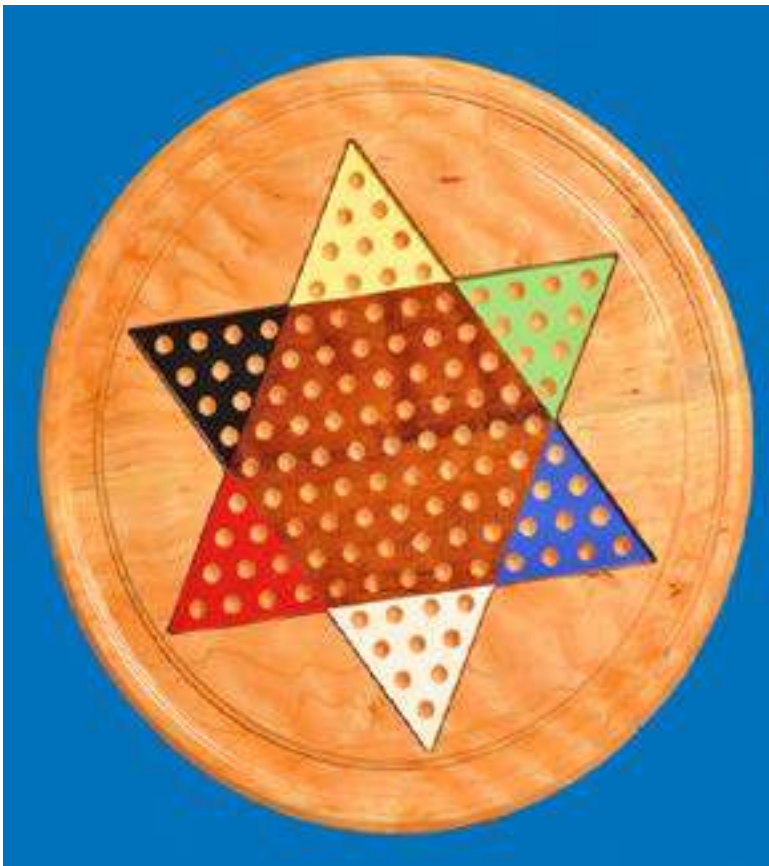
We'll keep you updated as we move along, but as we've stated In the past many changes will take time.
