Somewhere around the 2nd or 3rd week in February it was suggested by the CDC that everyone voluntarily self quarantine.

As a precaution the Board decided to not try to hold the March General Meeting. Just a few days later on March 23 the government decided that a mandatory quarantine was necessary. At that time the guild shut down from open shops. No one was allowed to do any personal work at the Guild. Several of the foremen volunteered to assist the Assets Director in utilizing the “down time” to upgrade much of the shop.

The Guild By-Laws require that we elect Guild officers at the April General Membership Meeting. The March general membership meeting was canceled. The April general meeting was also canceled. That moved the election into May. We knew we were going to have to cancel the May general meeting and probably would not be able to get a quorum of the membership if we could hold a June general meeting, so the decision was made to hold the election via email.

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused all of us to alter the way we normally do things. None of us have ever experienced anything like this in our lifetimes. There is no ‘playbook’ for these situations.

So, on May 6, the Board held a Zoom conference meeting and determined that we needed to

proceed with the vote so we can put new guild officers in place.

To be in accordance with the guild bylaws we announced on May 8th, the election would be coming via email on May 18 and if anyone wish to nominate someone “from the floor“ they should do that before May 18. As of May 18 no nominations were received so the secretary was instructed to accept the nominating committee ballot as the election ballot and proceed with an email election. To meet the quorum requirement we need to have at least 78 votes. The Secretary received 86 votes on May 18, as of the May 28th deadline the Secretary had received 140 votes or approximately 18% of our membership.

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JUNE SAFETY NEWS

Well, it goes without saying, we are coming out of the strangest 3 months I have ever experienced in my lifetime. For me, going without access to the shop for 3 long months is the biggest challenge I've faced during this lockdown/quarantine. The good news is, Governor Parsons has announced the lifting of restrictions state-wide and we will slowly start to see things crawling back to normal. The good thing out of all of this is that we were able to make some upgrades to the shop, improve dust evacuation, put a few new pieces of equipment into service and brighten things up dramatically in our shop. I do not have a lot to offer this month on the safety front other than the obvious... we will continue the requirement for masks, safety glasses and social distancing for the foreseeable future. As we get past the June 16th date that was set by the Governor, the Safety Committee will make decisions on how we go forward. My only piece of advice to everyone is to carefully consider whether your health condition is such that you are comfortable coming to the shop. As with anywhere in our community, if you have or had a fever, a persistent cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headaches, recent loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea, vomiting or diarrhea, I would ask that you NOT come to the shop under any circumstance. While the masks are a precautionary measure, they do not protect those around you should you come exhibiting any of the symptoms listed previously.

We are asking you all to be patient with us as this is new to us and we are making policy as we go, just like every other business in our community. We want the shop back to normal as badly as all of you do. We do not want to put anyone at risk unnecessarily, so please take the necessary precautions before you come to the shop. We will still have the sign-in board allowing for 10 members in the shop at a time. Hopefully, we can do away with this restriction in the coming week to 2 weeks. We will send out an email alert to everyone when that happens.

Please be aware that we have added two new machines to our arsenal. We now have an industrial radial arm saw that is positioned next to the sliding compound miter saw. They both share the same table and we have dedicated dust collection for both. We are developing specific safety guidelines for the use of the saw. The safe use of the radial arm saw isn't that dissimilar to the guidelines for the safe use of the sliding compound miter saw. The glaring difference is the significantly greater horsepower and the fact that you CANNOT make any adjustment to the angle of the cut or the bevel of the blade. This saw is STRICTLY for sizing stock to more useable lengths...no different from how we have been using the miter saw.

The other new machine is the 24"

Shop Fox surface sander. There really isn't any difference in using this new sander from the Grizzly we have had in operation. The big difference is the table adjustment is totally by hand crank. Nothing digital on this machine. As with all of our machines, if you aren't confident in using the machine, ask the Shop Foreman on duty to help you.

For our new members who have been patiently waiting to take the safety orientation, please continue to be patient. If you want to get your Green Card quickly, I encourage you to sign up for the Rough 2 Ready instruction. It will cost you a little bit of money, but you will receive one-on-one instruction, get your Green Card and go home with a box that you have made during the class. If you can't get on that schedule, I am anticipating that as the restrictions are lifted, we will resume the Sunday afternoon orientation schedule in July. We will announce when that is going to happen.

As we transition back to a state of normalcy (if that is even possible) we look forward to seeing you all in the shop. Be safe out there!

Our first foray into the video world will be a few safety videos that will cover the newly installed Radial Arm Saw and the 15" Shop Fox Belt sander. You should be able to view these videos before the July General Membership Meeting (we hope). We are looking for help in creating these videos and need help with on-camera personalities, people to help writing scripts, running the video cameras, editing and organizing the digital files and probably fifty other things we haven't even begun to realize that we need to take care of when producing a video. As we gain experience we are planning on providing a video on each of the machines and hand tools in the shop and create an online library that can be accessed through

HOW DO WE COMMUNICATE?

The Covid-19 situation may have changed how many people will interact with each other far into the future. The Communications Committee is looking to expand how we might be able to connect the Shop to the internet and therefore our members. Depending on how long we are required to limit shop access it would be advantageous to know how many people are using

the shop at any one time. Streaming a SIG or a Skill Builder would allow anyone to attend from the comfort of their home. Online training might even be an option.

Perhaps we might be able to setup a camera with a web connection, that is focused on the access control white board in the lobby. This would show how many people are currently using

the shop. Or maybe there is a software solution that people could check in and out of the shop in real time using their badge and a barcode reader. Somehow it would be nice to know how busy the shop is prior to leaving home.

The Guild does have access to G Suite Meet that provides us online meetings and

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IN THE SHOP

The shop is open! So let's talk dust collection. We have made a few changes that affect your work habits.

Starting with the sanding area. We have split the dust collector piping to serve either the widebelt sanders or the OSS and edge sanders. When turning on the dust collector make sure that the blast gate handle is pulled down for the machine group you plan to use. Also since it is an either/or arrangement if the widebelt sander is in use, the other sanding machinery cannot be used simultaneously. This tradeoff will give better dust evacuation from the machines.

We have reinstalled the airlock on the big dust collector so there is a wop-wop-wop sound and dumping into a regular trashcan. If you are using the planer or the jointer, keep an eye on the trashcan because it does fill up fast. Remember that this dust collector services the planer, jointer, and the three SawStops. Make sure no one is using any of these tools before turning off the dust collector.

There is also the addition of a radial arm saw and

therefore another dust collector that serves the radial arm saw and the mitersaw. The dust collector should be turned on when using the radial arm saw. It does not need to be turned on when using the mitersaw because of the short time to make the cut, an exception would be if you are making a lot of cuts and will be spending some time at the saw.

Another change is the replacement of the Lobo 12" widebelt sander with the ShopFox 15" widebelt sander. Operation is pretty similar to the Grizzly (turn on air, turn on dust collector). The table is raised manually and is a fairly coarse adjustment so like Brylcreem "a little dab will do ya". A full turn raises the bed 4mm (5/32"). The handwheel has 10 bumps and that makes movement of the wheel one bump ~ .015". In comparison the Grizzly we recommend raising the table .005" per pass. Taking a heavy pass does not give a desirable finish.

Welcome back, let's make something.

There is still a chance that nationally acclaimed woodcarver Mary May will be giving her class in July and that she will be here on the third Wednesday, which means that she could theoretically be available for an in-person program if there is an in-person general meeting. I have my doubts as there has been no significant change in the virus and most of us are in the critical category relative to

age when it comes to concerns about our health and the virus.

As a foreman, I feel the urge to tell you to please use the equipment as it was meant to be used. For example, remember to turn on the dust collector before you start cutting. I say this because I opened the shop on the first Wednesday in June, meaning that, at best, the shop had only been open for two short days, and when someone tried to use the dado saw table, they discovered that it was jammed to the hilt with shavings. It took a foreman more than a half hour, mostly on his knees, to clean out the machine and to get it operational again. That's crazy! Don't be in a rush when you are using equipment that you

haven't used in a few months. Think it through and take time to get back into the correct routine. And please don't stop by and try to have a long personal discussion. You are probably already raising your voice to be heard and maybe standing closer, too. It's loud when equipment is running and none of us are wearing proper masks that will totally prevent the spread of the virus. So I want to protect my social distance by staying far from you. 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GUILD MEMBER'S EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT

Charlie Baul is a 14 year-old student member of KCWG, nephew of Chris McCauley, grandson of Mike McCauley, and great-grandson of Jim McCauley, all four generations are Guild members.

Charlie's Eagle Scout Project was to install 24 - 4"x 4" x 48" posts at Cave Spring Park located at Gregory and Blue Ridge Blvd.

Charlie needed to use pressure treated posts due to



ground contact so his prep work could not be done at the Guild. However, he utilized skills learned by observing as a student member of the Guild.

He used a Miter Saw to cut the 8' posts in half. Then used a sliding Miter Saw to chamfer the top of each post so rain would run off and for aesthetics.

He then had to program a CNC machine to custom engrave all four sides of the posts. His grandfather helped by using carving tools to 'clean-out' the letters. Then each set of vertical lettering had to be painted inside the groove paths left by the CNC engraving, with exterior enamel.

Charlie used a drill press with a Forstner bit to create a 1/4" x 2" disk in each marker that was painted with specific trail color. He also used another Forstner bit on the opposite side to inlay a 1.5" laser engraved coin that indicated it was his Eagle Project, his Troop number, the year of installation and his name.

Installation day was June 6, 2020 with eight family groups, 25 workers, installing 24 trail markers.

Charlie's project took approximately 400 man hours.
