FROM THE SHOP

The tools in the shop for the most part are general purpose and available for whatever operation the tool is capable of that does not harm tool or operator. Limitations on use either protect the tool



(chisels are not glue scrapers, prybars or screwdrivers) or the operator (minimum length of wood to use the jointer). There one machine however that has strict restrictions on its' use. the Bandsaw. Resaw

The Resaw bandsaw is for resawing thick lumber, that is a depth of cut exceeding 3". It is not for cutting green wood, wood with bark, cross cutting logs into cookies (why can't that fad die?). The reason for

the 3" minimum is that the blade that is on the saw is specifically designed for cutting thick wood. The tooth spacing and gullet depth are designed to cut and remove the sawdust effectively in thick cuts.

The resaw is not for making curved cuts, that is exactly what we are trying to avoid. There are other bandsaws for that. At this point I'm thinking of all the operations not to make on the resaw and I realize that making a list of Don'ts will inevitably result in someone defending their action "You didn't say I couldn't use the saw to make granite veneer" (by the way, if that's what you want, talk to Jake next door at Central Surfaces).

If we only had one bandsaw, then things would be different. The Resaw bandsaw was purchased to do one job, cutting thick solid raw lumber. If your project doesn't meet that definition then this isn't the saw for you. I'm reminded of the line at

the end of the movie 2010 The Year We Make Contact "All these worlds are yours except Europa. Attempt no landing there."



Dedication to your Open Shop session, members will plan their shop time based upon when we have said the shop will be open. You have committed to have the shop open when you said it would be. Don't over extend yourself and become unreliable.

- You know where you'll be during your sessions
- No excess income concerns for your taxes

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SANTA'S 2021 WORKSHOP EVENT

Many of you know I portray Father Christmas, a.k.a. Saint Nicholas.



Previously, at Cave Springs Park, Chris and I put together an impromptu Santa's Workshop, it was a huge hit (basically the same Christkindle). Difference was the kids got to make a toy with Santa Claus. (thanks to Dave Kraatz for permission to use his truck design)

The plan is to have the kids come in the front door, pick a block of wood, go to each station with their block of wood, and our woodworkers transform their block into a wooden toy truck. Each station would be "roped" off with only a KCWG Woodworker within 2' of the machine. We would need Drill Presses with stations for drilling axel holes and truck window.

Crosscut sleds to cut back of cab and front of truck. Bandsaw to cutoff bed of truck. Routers to round off edges. Axles would already be cut; we will buy wheels from Craftparts. Truck beds and window backs will be attached in the handtool room.

They will proceed to the handtool room and assemble their truck with Santa's helpers, meet and talk with Santa Claus. As they leave the room the Turners will present a unique, turned, toy top that will be placed in a hole drilled in the middle of the truck bed.

Exiting the handtool room, participants will enter a Holiday Giftmart with handmade gifts.

outreach, share our joy of woodworking, give the kids a unique experience, demonstrate the process of making a "simple" toy, bring parents in to see our shop (with potential membership), and provide a "marketplace" for your craft/gift items.

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"HOBBS"ERVATIONS BEDSIDE CHEST CLASS COMING THIS FALL

As much as I enjoy building furniture for the fun of it, many of my pieces are utilitarian, as in what do I need around my house, and what piece can I justify to my wife the time and expense. For an extremely utilitarian piece, I am teaching the bedside chest starting in September.

Say you need a bedside table, but need more storage? Suppose you want to learn the basics of case furniture, but the thought of lugging a full-size piece back and forth to the guild makes you shudder? The answer to both is a nice, compact, super useful bedside chest.

Things that will be learned in the class:

- Hand-cut dovetails. With a dovetailed case and three dovetailed drawers, this piece will give you plenty of practice.
- Drawer construction and fitting. Building a drawer and having it fit properly is a skill that is within your reach, but it helps to be shown how.
- Building and attaching bracket feet to a case piece.


And in case you are wondering – there's no carving (wait, is he serious?)! Here are some of the techniques and tools that the class will cover:


- Measuring and marking sounds easy but there are some good fundamentals to review.
- Handplane skills nothing too fancy, just a good staple to learn.
- Sawing to a line dovetails will help you train your muscle memory and by the end you will be able to repeat this motion.
- Chisel skills.
- How to break down a more complex piece into easy workable steps. All pieces employ these strategies to a degree.

This class will run over 8 weeks from September into November, and the pieces will be made from



walnut. I will take care of the machining and the grunt work so we can focus on the finer skills. I hope you will give it a try – it will be a fun time.










MEMBERSHIP RETROSPECTIVE: 20 YEARS OF GUILD LEADERSHIP

DO YOU NEED SOME TRAINING?



It has been a while since an article from Training has come out. A busy work schedule coupled with a pandemic sort of put a damper on any training news.

But now we are back and active again. Local guild members are teaching courses and we are seeking others to fill out our training hours. We had a class by world renown carver Mary May this last June and in September we plan to welcome Matt Kenney (https://www.mekwoodworks.com/about.html) to our shop. Still working on the class details, so stay tuned.

Due to an increased amount of last minute cancellations from unpaid students we have decided to change the class signup process. Our current process is not working because people who really want to take the class are unable to participate and others who think that they may want to take the class sign up and then end up canceling later. The cancellations

often occur when it is too late for us to fill their spot from someone on the wait list. As a result, we have classes that are not being taught at full capacity. This is unfair to our instructors, our other guild members, and the training staff who spend extra time trying to create a full class.

Going forward our new policy will require payment at the time of signing up for a class. This means that you will need to pay for all classes via credit card.

If you do find that you are unable to attend a class, we will provide a full refund if we are able to fill your spot with another guild member on the wait list.

Finally, we are starting up the monthly skill builders. David Kraatz will be leading off on the first Saturday in August (8/7/2021) starting at 2pm at the guild shop. The topic presented in August will be preparing a basic handtool set. No cost for these skill builders.

If you have anything that you wanted to know about woodworking, let us know and we will see if it can be set up as a skill builder presentation.

THOUGHTS ON SAFETY

As the summer heats up, so does the activity in the shop. We still aren't seeing the activity levels that were typical pre-covid, but it is getting there. I have noticed several people coming into the shop with rough-sawn lumber that has been acquired from "grandpa's barn" or from local mills and a problem that seems to be typical is showing up. As people are processing their lumber, they are encountering tension in their boards. By tension, I mean, as the material is being ripped, the cut is literally closing down on the riving knife and stopping the rip cut. I have personally experienced this issue when ripping long pieces of walnut. Why it only seems to happen on walnut I will never know, but that has been my experience. Boards that have sat untouched for months or even years, magically exhibit a tendency to start moving as soon as you start ripping or processing it. On several occasions I have had to push so hard, I couldn't push it through the cut any longer. The cut had closed down so tight on the riving knife, I literally stopped the cut. This is a

dangerous condition because we all have a tendency to want to push harder the more resistance we encounter. The inherent risk is that of having your hand slip and push it right into the blade. I have found that it is a good idea to turn off the saw and find a scrap of wood that you can cut a wedge from that will allow you to put a wedge in the kerf behind the riving knife to open the kerf up and release the grip it has on the riving knife. Most of the time, the tension is great enough that you can't even lift the board off of the riving knife to start the cut over. If you encounter this issue, and you're not confident to cut the wedge and remove the board yourself, please don't hesitate to call on your shop foreman to give you a hand.

It is also good policy when processing rough-sawn lumber, to be sure and joint one face and one edge before cutting it on the table saws. We always recommend that you examine your lumber for cup, warp, twist or bow. Many times, these conditions can be corrected



on the jointer, but many times they can't. If you have a board that has extreme twist, warp, cup or bow, it is highly recommended you consider getting another board and trashing the bad one. A lot of work can be saved by examining whether anything will be left after you joint it. A long board with a twist, might be usable if you cut it closer to the length you need, versus trying to joint the twist out of it. Always....when in doubt, ask your shop foreman for guidance. Remember, we don't recommend cutting a rough-sawn board on the table saw until it has been jointed. The risks of cutting rough-sawn

lumber on the table saws are far too high. Please don't do it!

TREASURY REPORT

The Guild is in good financial condition as we start the second half of 2021. Activity appears to be getting back to normal and we anticipate a successful remainder of the year. Getting back to in person monthly meetings will be another step in that direction.

At the end of the second quarter revenues were above budget forecast and expenses were bellow budget. For the year we are in the black by approximately \$38,000. That number will go down until December when membership renewal begins.

The new three-year lease started in June. The lease has a significant increase in rent due to an added



Maintenance Common Area (CAM) requirement. The CAM charge includes estimated charges for outside maintenance as well as property tax and building insurance. The CAM charge includes other properties, and the Guild pays a percentage of the total cost. The cost is estimated during the year and trued up at the end of the year.

During the first half of the year the Guild purchased a 15" Powermatic Planer and a Holzher Panel Saw.

More detailed monthly Statements of Operation are available on the web site in the Member Only area.

I want the thank all of you for your support of the Guild and hope to see many of you at the General Meeting July 21st.

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





The Guild has received a donation from an individual that includes a number of woodworking plates depicting heavy timber




framing, furniture construction, stair framing, and general information. These were published in 1900 and many of them credit Andre Roubo (1739 -

1791). We have contacted Linda Hall Library to see if we can receive some more information about the plates. They are not able to store the plates but they did give us a name of a museum on the east coast that may be interested. We will also be looking to see if the Nelson, the Art Institute. or a public library may be interested. The titles of the three books







are: Nouveau Roubo L'Art de la Menuisere published 1900, Traite Theorique et Pratique Charpente by L. Mazerolle published 1900, Les Meubles Modernes du Menuisier published in 1926, and an additional collection of individual plates. A sampling of the plates is seen here.

HANDTOOL SIG - ROBERT YOUNG

Join us on Sunday July 25th from 2pm to 4pm at the KCWG Shop as we discuss and demo the basic skills you need to use joinery saws and handsaws in your shop. Even if you are accustomed to doing everything with a table saw, chop saw or RAS, knowing how to properly use handsaws and joinery saws will improve your shop time.

And if you are more interested in doing your fine work with hand tools, knowing how to saw accurately and with the right saw this is the SIG demonstration for you.

We will be defining the three types of saw cuts you can make with a handsaw and demonstrating each. We will also be discussing and demonstrating some of the basic shop appliances (snobby hand-tool woodworker's name for "jig") you should be building for yourself when handsawing.

Our focus will be primarily on the western (cuts on the push stroke) style of saws but if you have experience with pull saws (e.g. Japanese saws) and feel comfortable demonstrating their use, please bring them along and some wood for demonstrations.



POWERTOOL SIG - CHUCK SAUNDERS

The Power Tool Repair and Restoration SIG will finally resume our regular meetings on Sunday August 1st at 3:00pm. We still have our Unisaw project to resurrect. For those who forgot we have a Rockwell/Delta Unisaw 10" tablesaw and a Walker Turner shaper that we are rejuvenating. Nothing like taking something apart and putting it back together to make you familiar with the inner workings. There will also be time to discuss your current tool issues.

Shop-wide rules

- 1. Be sure that a shop foreman is present, and wear your green card while working in the shop.
- 2. Approach your work with a safe attitude!
 - **Focus**. Concentrate on what you're doing, and don't get distracted. Distraction causes injury.
 - **Be strong.** No, this does not mean muscle strength. It means the strength to do it right, even when you are under time pressure. Follow the safety procedures.
 - **Don't rush.** Take the time to do things correctly and using the right guard or personal protective equipment (PPE). Is saving a few minutes worth a lifelong injury?
 - Work responsibly. If you care about yourself and your family, follow the safety procedures.
 - **Don't gamble**. A one-in-a-thousand risk is not worth the possible cost. Do not play the odds. Follow the safety procedures.
- 3. Give the work your undivided attention.
- **4.** Wear safety glasses with side shields when the shop is in operation, wherever you are working, not just when you are using a machine yourself. Glasses should be ANSI Z87.1 rated.
- **5. Protect your hearing.** Hearing protection is *required* in the CNC Shop area. However, it is a good idea to use hearing protection anytime when working in the shop. Consider using other personal protective equipment (PPE), such as a mask or respirator when working in dusty conditions.
- **6. Do not wear anything that might be caught by a machine.** This includes rings, wristwatches, other jewelry, loose-fitting clothing, long sleeves, and gloves. Tie back long hair.
- 7. Do not wear open-toed shoes, sandals, or flip-flops when working in the shop.
- **8. Ask for help.** Unless you are *sure* that you know what you are doing and can handle it yourself, ask the foreman or another member for help.
- **9. Stand comfortably**. Maintain a balanced stance at all times so that you do not fall or lean against the machine you are operating.
- **10. Maintain a 2-foot perimeter.** Make sure you keep people, obstructions, and any debris that might impair traction at least 2 feet away from the machine you are using.
- **11. Use the dust collector.** If the machine you are using has a dust collector, make sure it is on and the blast gate for the machine is open before starting.
- **12. Observe the 3-inch rule.** Always keep your hands and fingers 3 inches away from the blade of a power saw, the bit of a drill press, the abrasive medium of a sander and any other moving parts of a woodworking machine.

- **13. Stay behind the blade.** Never place your hands or fingers directly in line with any blade where you could cut them if you slipped.
- **14. If it's broken, don't use it.** Report malfunctions, missing parts, etc. to the foreman immediately.
- **15. Tidy up after you set up.** Clear the work area of any wrenches, chuck keys or other adjustment tools before turning on a machine.
- **16. Avoid surprises.** Inspect your stock carefully for knots, twists, nails, staples, other foreign material, etc.
- **17. Wait until it starts.** Do not start a machine with the blade, bit, or abrasive medium in contact with your workpiece. Wait until the machine is running at normal operating speed.
- **18. Don't force it.** If you need to use excessive force with any woodworking machine, something is wrong. Stop and consult the shop foreman.
- **19. Wait until it stops.** Never clear small pieces while the blade, bit, or abrasive medium is moving. And don't leave a machine work area until the machine is off and has come to a complete stop.
- **20. Unplug it.** Always disconnect the power before changing a blade or performing any other maintenance operation.
- **21. Use the correct guard.** Before using any power tool, be sure all guards are in place and working properly.
- **22.** Clean up. When you are through with any machine or hand tool, clean the work area with brush, broom and dustpan or vacuum, and put away whatever you took out. (Yes, this is a safety issue as well as a courtesy.)

Start with a risk assessment to ensure a safe work area:

- 1. Is the area clear of people and obstructions?
- 2. Is the floor clear of sawdust and chips that might impair traction?
- 3. Is your workpiece of a size and weight that you can handle safely without help? Is it so small you are at risk of violating the 3-inch rule?
- 4. Does the workpiece have any foreign material (nails, staples, etc.) embedded in it?
- 5. Are all the guards on your machine in place and working?
- 6. Does the environment warrant your use of personal protective equipment in addition to safety glasses?
- 7. Is the blade, bit, or cutter head, clean and sharp, so as to prevent jams or other mishaps?
