FROM THE SHOP

Smokey Yunick said "I've never broken the rules but I've bent some pretty bad". We don't have a lot of rules here in the shop and your Shop Foreman is there to make sure the rules are being followed. Primarily that duty is informing new members of the rules of our shop and reminding members preoccupied with their task at hand. Now nobody likes being corrected, especially when you know the rules but just forgot. You want to say "Hey, I'm not a bad person, I just forgot, don't judge me". I get it, we've all been there. Now remember that the Foreman is just your fellow member volunteering their time to allow the shop to be open for all our use. The foremen are willing to step in to stop someone from being unsafe. I can tell you that the foremen do not enjoy injecting themselves into your day, but if you need a



reminder, they have agreed to remind you.

Some rules you may not agree with, you don't think that the rule is necessary and you are not at risk. You don't follow that rule at home in your shop and your friends don't either. You may feel that this rule makes your

woodworking more dangerous than it would be if you didn't follow the rule. Who are we to mandate that you have to follow this rule? You don't know of anyone who has been protected by this rule. But if you want to use the shop you have to follow the rules. So you do, kinda, if anyone is watching, otherwise forget it. So now the formen have to come around and repeatedly remind you of the rules and you comply until they turn away. Now it has become a game of cat and mouse (Foreman and member). The member revels in their cleverness at avoiding the rules and showing they can't be controlled by The Man. The foreman on the other hand tires of this pretty quickly and starts to ask themselves if there is something else they could be doing with their free time. I don't want to scare anyone but I will say that I am not flooded with members willing to regularly devote their time as a foreman so if a foreman leaves it may mean that Open Shop availability decreases (it's a supply chain issue or something).

To summarize, we have rules in place if you want to be in the shop, if you want to use the shop, you have to follow the rules. Enough with the games, Wear Your Safety Glasses!





KCWG AND KC, MO MASK MANDATE LIFTED



November 4, 2021 -- Kansas City Council on Thursday voted to stop mandating masks inside most public indoor spaces. However, masks will still be required in schools amid concerns that COVID-19 case numbers could jump back up during the holiday season.

Kansas City Council voted to dropped its mask mandate for most adults on Thursday, as COVID-19 case numbers drop across the region.

The city council voted 11 to 2 to amend the existing mask mandate to apply only inside school buildings and school buses through at least Dec. 2. Council members Brandon Ellington and Heather Hall voted against the measure.

Kanas City's mask mandate was set to expire on Thursday, Nov. 4. Under the updated ordinance, wearing face masks indoors in public venues is only encouraged.

The move puts Kansas City's guidance at odds with the Jackson County Legislature, which voted on Monday to extend the county mask mandate for another three weeks.

Kansas City Mayor Quinton Lucas said that keeping masks in schools for at least another month will give younger children more time to get vaccinated, now that they're eligible. This week, the CDC approved Pfizer's low-dose COVID-19 vaccine for children ages 5-11, and doses will become available to Kansas City-area kids as soon as this weekend.

"The policy basis is to ensure that schools may operate as safely as possible, that persons inside of public or private school buildings or students from kindergarten up to and including 12th grade (that) are attending class will be protected," Lucas said.

The Kansas City Health Department reported to a council committee on Wednesday that its community risk rating had dropped from the most severe level defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The city currently reports an infection rate of 99.9 new cases per 100,000 people, just below the CDC threshold for "high" spread, although the infection rate for Jackson County as a whole remains significantly higher.

Still, the health department's interim director Frank Thompson said they're recommending people continue to voluntarily wear their masks.

"We recognize that there's the potential, if everyone just takes their mask off and kind of goes back to business as usual, there's a chance for our numbers to trend back upwards," Thompson said.

On Wednesday, council members Melissa Robinson and Eric Bunch expressed concerns about dropping the mask mandate on the cusp of the holiday season. Bunch said without a mandate in place, he fears that everyone will guit wearing masks like they did when the order was first rescinded in the spring.

Both Ellington and Hall have voted multiple times against extending Kansas City's mask mandate. Ellington said he did not think it made sense to continue asking children to mask up when they are at lower risk of severe disease.

Hall raised concerns that the mask requirement would be confusing for students in counties without mask mandates, but who attend schools that overlap Kansas City.

"I think that's very confusing and I just feel like we should stay in our lane and be a city government," Hall said. "I feel like the state and school boards all need to mandate the school boards in the schools, not us."

Lucas said that he's spoken with local district superintendents who requested to keep the masking requirement in schools, because doing so reduces quarantine times.

Schools owned or operated by a religious organization will be excluded from the order, an exception that city officials said is intended to avoid potential lawsuits.

DECEMBER SAFETY NOTES

TTTell gang, this isn't really a safety item, but you get when you join the Guild. in some ways, it is a safety issue. Many (if not most) of you who utilize the shop or come for the monthly meeting, have occasion to use our bathrooms. I am by no means a "clean freak", but the Men's restroom comes dangerously close to being a bio-hazard. The Ladies restroom gets used so little, it doesn't come close to the level of grossness that the Men's restroom does. We all know that men tend to be less fastidious than the ladies, so I am driven to make an announcement. This announcement will be followed by additional communications to all of our members. It was discussed at our most recent Leadership Committee meeting and it was agreed that we will implement a new policy.

Up to this point, those of us in the Foreman ranks have taken the initiative to keep the bathrooms clean. It is important to remind everyone that those who serve the Guild as Foremen, are not the resident janitors or custodians. We are merely there to serve as a safety enforcer or to lend a hand or to help solve a problem. We really don't have a job description but I can assure you, there was nothing ever put in writing or suggested that the foremen were also responsible for cleaning the bathrooms or kitchen.

I've harped on it before and it bears repeating.... we have a co-op shop. We all have a shared responsibility to maintain and keep up the conditions in our shop. We have gone far too long without issuing this new policy, but we are starting this year. The Guild will ensure that adequate cleaning supplies are provided for your use and if the bathrooms and kitchen are cleaned weekly, it won't be such a daunting task to keep it clean.

Realistically, our members come and go and some people may forget or just decide they don't want to do it. While we haven't refined the policy details yet, I'm thinking there may be an additional consequence for not doing your scheduled clean up chore.

We will either refine and adopt this new policy or it may be necessary to raise dues to where we can afford to hire a cleaning service to come in and do it for us. I haven't researched the cost of this method, but I doubt anyone is going to like the dues increase.

With our fixed costs continually rising, this is not an expense we really need to incur. We have plenty of members to count on to do their part. Like the old saying goes... "Many hands make light the work."

I'm confident we will make this work.

NOVEMBER MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW Sliding Compound Miter Saw

The miter saw is a power tool used to make quick, accurate crosscuts and miter cuts. A compound miter saw can make simultaneous miter and bevel cuts, and a sliding compound miter saw like the ones in the KCWG shop has rails for the motor head and blade to travel on to allow cuts in wider stock. This saw is often used to cut stock to rough length at the beginning of a project.



Safety Rules

- 1. Always hold the workpiece securely on the table and against the fence when making cuts. Where possible, use clamps to hold the workpiece in place—and always do so when cutting a workpiece so short that holding it would violate the 3-inch rule. Be aware of the risk of kickback
- 2. Support the end of a long workpiece at the same height as the saw table.
- When cutting a cupped or bowed piece of stock, make sure the workpiece is oriented to leave no gap between it and the fence or the saw table at the point of the cut. If not, you risk pinching the blade and causing kickback.
- 4. Never reach under the saw blade or perform a cross-handed operation.
- 5. When you start the saw, allow the blade to reach full speed before cutting; do not force the blade and always start the cut gently.
- 6. When using a sliding compound miter saw like the ones in the KCWG shop, make your cut in three steps:
 - a. First pull the motor head out.
 - b. Then start the saw.
 - Finally, push the blade down into the stock and towards fence to make the cut

If your work piece is more than 1" thick, make multiple cutting passes to complete your crosscut.

- 7. Don't raise the motor head from the workpiece until the blade has come to a complete stop.
- 8. Never try to remove or clamp the workpiece to the saw while the blade is rotating.
- 9. When installing a blade, match the direction of the arrow on the blade with the direction of the arrow on the tool casting. The teeth at the bottom of the blade should point back toward the fence.
- 10. Use only blades with arbor holes that fit the arbor of the saw. Be sure the arbor nut is tight to prevent slipping or loosening of the blade.
- 11. Use sharp blades. A damaged or dull blade could throw teeth, causing serious injury. Make sure the blade is clean. Buildup on the surface of the blade will cause excessive friction.
