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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"'ve often suffered from a lack of time management skills in the shop. For too many times, I've wasted time on doing a task that is not important or think a task will take so many minutes only to look at the 2. Then just get them done. Anything completed clock hours later and think "why is this taking so long?"

I found a decent article. "How to Get The Most From Your Day," by Robert Robillard on the website A Concord Carpenter (https:// www.aconcordcarpenter.com/timemanagement-2.html).

With all the tasks and life events we enjoy (or endure), better time management will help us focus our time on our projects and get the most out of our shop time.

Here's are the steps that Mr. Robillard suggests:

1. Make a list and identify the two most important items on that list and then do them. Make your list the night before. Once that list is completed, ask yourself, "What two things, if completed,

would have the biggest impact on my day, job, or bottom line?"

after those two priorities are extra!



3. Work through your list ONE item at a time, crossing them off as you complete them. Often, we're tempted to multitask other activities while working on my lists. Don't do this...don't start the next one until you're done with the first one.

The KEY is to focus on one item at a time and completely finish it.

- 4. Do the hard things first and save the easy stuff for later. Many people try to get the easy stuff done first, attacking your most difficult problems or tasks first while your body and your mind are fresh is a good approach.
- 5. Group your other activities. Paperwork, checking e-mail, checking voice-mail, paying bills, typing estimates, etc., are incredible time drains. Paperwork and other non-essential activities especially are best grouped at the end of the day. Although these things seem important (and some are) don't keep getting tangled up in them.
- Prepare your next day the night before. It also allows you to get more rest because you're not worrying about or planning your day as you're trying to fall asleep at night.

One thing I might add to Mr. Robillard's list is to take a few minutes after completing a task is to clean up after yourself. Sweep the bench and floor and put away tools you won't need in the near future. It does wonders for me to be able to see the bench after clearing away plane shavings and sawdust and to put away recently used router bits. You get the idea.

That's it from the shop this month. See you in the shop and work safely. Masks are optional for the vaccinated and boosted, and strongly encouraged for the unvaccinated. The Guild will continue this policy unless the city mandates something different.

TURF BOXES..."THEY'RE BAAACK"

Te have an opportunity coming up for members to pitch in and help to build turf boxes for the 1000 FieldTurf Company. We've made several sizes and versions of these sample boxes over the years, and Turf Boxes have raised a lot of capitol that have supported KCWG operations over the years and are one of the major reasons that we are able to keep guild membership dues low and affordable. These boxes are of a new design and with these changes come new challenges. Boxes will be built in batches spread throughout the year.



The newly designed box is a clamshell design, where an entire closed box is built, then it is cut apart to form top and bottom parts. Hinges and latches are then added and finally each box will have a finish sprayed on and logos silkscreened. If you have expertise in either of these areas, please contact me at barrog67@gmail.com.

We are working out the details of the manufacturing processes and will soon be asking for volunteers. Watch for Sign Up Genius e-mails later this week where you will be able to sign up to help. We anticipate needing a few people each day for several days to complete the first phase of the project.

KCWG OWNS A LASER ENGRAVER

n January 19, 2022, KCWG received a Rabbit Laser Engraver. Previously if the Guild needed anything engraved (i.e., Epic beverage carriers 2020) we relied on outside companies or organizations. In late December 2021 the uncertainty of relying on groups

outside the Guild was brought to the point that the Guild realized that purchasing a Laser Engraver was in our best interests. We currently have a contract to build 1,000 Field Boxes over the next year, most of them need to be Laser Engraved.

Mike McCauley has been working with and using Laser Engravers since 2017 and has been asked to help co-lead the new Laser Engraver SIG. Dr. Curtis Alexander has been using Light Burn software for several years and will be co-leader of the Laser Engraver SIG.

The Rabbit Laser Engraver is somewhat different from other CO2 Laser Engravers members might be familiar with (i.e., Johnson County Library Maker Space or MCCC Fab Lab) so before members can use the KCWG Rabbit Laser Engraver some training will be required. The Laser Engraver SIG will be offering free training on Wednesday evenings during February, March, and April, but members must sign up through SignUp Genius. The L.E. SIG will be

concentrating on training until the end of April. The SIG will start meeting, sharing ideas and best practices on the 4th Wednesday of each Month beginning in April.

At KCWG only wood can be Laser engraved or

cut. Currently only wood 3/8" (or 0.375) thickness less can be cut with our Laser. Thicker wood is capable of being cut but that requires a different focal tube which we do not have at this point. We do not currently have a rotator mechanism for laser engraving round items. Skill Builder the introduction, the question of engraving other materials was brought up but currently only wood will be allowed. Additional materials might be explored later as the L.E. SIG becomes established.



To use the KCWG Laser Engraver members must attend training and a "rabbit" sticker will be attached to your Guild name tag. As with other Guild equipment only Green tag members may use the Laser Engraver following training. Although student, senior, and regular members may take this training, they may not use the Laser Engraver without a Green tag. Keys to the Laser Engraver must be obtained from the active foreman. The foreman will not give the key to anyone that does not have a special rabbit sticker

Engraver and list the time they arrive at the engraver. There will be considerable interest in using the Laser Engraver initially so user will be **limited to two hours per day** at the engraver. Both library computers have the Guild registered Light Burn software. Users should design their projects before arriving at the Laser Engraver and transfer to the Laser Engraver computer via thumb drive.

Once the user has signed-in, recording their start time, others desiring to use the Laser Engraver may sign-in, at the laser engraver, to "hold" a place in line. Noting the current users sign-in time and knowing the current user has two-hours from their start time.

Inherently Laser Engravers can catch projects on fire, particularly when engraving wood, so users cannot leave the Laser Engraver unattended while the laser is working. Foreman have

on their name tag. The member will obtain the been instructed to turn off the laser engraver

unattended. That user will not be allowed to use the Laser Engraver for the remainder of the day. If the user needs to use facilities or get a drink, they will need to ask someone to "babysit" for the brief time they need to be away, abusers will be denied use of the Laser Engraver.

Thumb drives that have been left at the Laser Engraver computer will be removed, placed in a "free" cup and anyone may claim that thumb drive. Take your thumb drive with you.

The Guild will not supply materials to engrave, users are responsible for bringing their own

wood and taking the materials with them or putting in their storage area. As with all Guild equipment, Guild projects have priority and may utilize more than the two-hour time limit. If the users sign-in indicates a Guild project, then ask the user how long they intend to keep the laser tied up.

For those wanting to obtain Light Burn software the information needed is that the KCWG Rabbit Laser engraver is a CO2 laser, uses a Ruida controller (model # RDC6445G(EC)), and the bed is 914mm x 609mm. This will allow your purchased software to create a file compatible with the KCWG Laser Engraver.



LITTLE KITTY, PATHOGENS AND FIRST AID

It's funny how being in the shop, doing work and having a minor accident can shake loose a thought regarding that accident. Even funnier is how I manage to twist that into a cogent thought that is relevant to

Safety.... yours, mine and ours. As I was toiling away cutting mortises by hand this past week, I managed to slip (ever so slightly) and managed to put a little slice in my finger. Nothing serious, mind you, but just enough of a slice to draw blood. Many of you who know me have also heard me say, more than once, that no project of mine is complete without leaving a little of me behind in that project. Blood seems to be a common touch in everything I

build anymore. I don't do it intentionally, but it happens. That is why they are called "accidents". Worse, I usually manage to leave a little of that blood around the shop, on the machines, on the height adjustment cranks on the table saws, and just about anywhere else I happen to visit in the shop. If you are like me, a little knick is no big deal and you usually go on with your work not giving it a second thought. Seeing that blood all over my work usually sends me to the first aid cabinet for a "Little Kitty" band aid and my work commences.

This brings me to the subject at hand. Blood borne pathogens are a real and serious threat whether you think it is real or not. We all live in a state of mind that we are perfectly healthy and indestructible, and the absolute

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last thing we should worry about is getting someone else sick by coming in contact with the telltale evidence of our little accident. It is probably warranted that we don't need to worry, but the problem is, you don't know for sure. Let me remind you that if you are touching machines, switches or anything else that someone else has touched, you have entered the category of "bacterial infection" and that is a serious issue. So the two things you have to consider here are

- 1. Are you potentially endangering yourself and,
 - 2. Are you endangering someone who is going to touch that surface after you?

To be clear, a blood borne pathogen is an infectious microorganism in human blood that can cause disease in humans. These pathogens include, but are not limited to, Hepatitis B (HBV) Hepatitis C (HCV) and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV). While I doubt any of our members have any of these maladies, I can't be certain, so the first line of defense against contracting any of these pathogens, I need to be certain to clean my wound, apply a simple antibiotic ointment and apply a bandage or wrap with a sterile gauze bandage. This helps you from spreading any pathogens around the shop (if you are carrying one knowingly or unknowingly) and it protects you from the bacteria that are residing on those surfaces you decide to touch after getting your little cut. Either way, it is common sense and common courtesy to get yourself protected by applying a little first aid to your wound. Everyone in the shop will thank you. Our first aid cabinets are well-

stocked and are there for your benefit. Please use them when needed.

Jointer

Jointers are used to prepare stock for making joints by smoothing and flattening an edge or surface of stock. They have high-speed rotating knives that remove material from the bottom face or edge of the board as it is pushed past them. Typically a jointer is used to make one face of a board flat, straight, and smooth and to make one adjacent edge flat, straight,



smooth, and perpendicular to the jointed face.

Safety Rules

- 1. Set the jointer to remove no more than 1/16" of stock per pass.
- 2. Joint only stock that is at least 12" long and narrower than the cutting head.
- 3. Use push blocks when needed to keep your hands at least 3" from the cutter head at all times.
- 4. Do not joint the face of a board that is thinner than 5/8".
- 5. Although the fence can be tilted, jointing the stock at an angle could be difficult. The use of push blocks and hold-down devices is highly recommended. If possible, consider another machine for this operation.
- Make sure that any cutter head in back of the fence is covered by a guard.
- 7. Always run wood through the jointer with the grain running parallel to the length of the jointer bed; never joint across the grain. Examine the stock for grain direction, warp, twist, burl, swirl, kink, and cup before jointing.
- 8. When straightening a cupped or bowed piece of stock the concave face should face down and the humped or convex face up.
- 9. Always feed toward the out-feed table.
- 10. When you are jointing the face of a board, don't let your thumb or fingers hang over the back end to push it through the jointer.
- 11. Walk a long board through the cut. Never stand facing the fence.
- 12. Avoid applying pressure to the leading few inches of stock, since that may result in tipping the board or your fingers into the cutter at the start of the cut.
- 13. Do not back your workpiece out of a cut; either keep going in the direction of the out-feed table or shut the machine off and lift your workpiece off once the cutter head has come to a stop


