



SAFETY THOUGHTS AND COMMENTS

little introduction, my last name is spelled Venne but is pronounced vain, no one ever gets it right on the first try. I grew up in Wisconsin, spend most of my career in



Minneapolis with a few years in the Caribbean. I relocated to Kansas City in 2008 and really like the area. I have been a guild member for 5 or 6 years now, mostly visiting the shop on Saturdays and Sundays. I spent my career in the hospitality industry, working as an executive chef/ food and beverage director. I shifted from the kitchen to the classroom about 20 years ago and worked as an academic director for the private culinary school and most recently have been teaching culinary arts for Shawnee Mission School District to high schoolers.

Stepping into the safety director role offered me the opportunity to think about what it means to be safe in

the workshop. I found the answer when I was speaking with a high school baseball coach between games. had commented on a great play by the catcher who recovered a ball that got by the first baseman and threw a runner out at second base. the coach's response was that the kid had great situational awareness. In baseball when playing defense situational include awareness can knowing the number of outs, runners on base, the count and where you should be on the field. On the most basic level, situational awareness is about knowing what is going on in the environment and its implications for the present and the future (Endsley 1988). I think that if we consider situational awareness as it relates to the workshop, we can identify a few key points; are you being aware of your surroundings, do you know the capabilities for each machine and the potential dangers they present, are you in the right mindset to work in the shop and not be distracted? Identifying key points just the first set to workshop safety. How we perceive each situation is based on experiences. New woodworkers may not know to adjust the speed on the router



table when using a larger bit creating a potential safety concern and a seasoned wood worker may be so comfortable with the router table and absently mindedly the 3-inch rule. Recognizing and understanding our own limitations and not getting too comfortable in our abilities in any giving situation is an important factor in shop safety. Situational awareness requires constant vigilance of your circumstances to identify issues and eventually predict problems before they arise. When in doubt, ask a shop foreman.

WOOD WORDS THE PODCAST



FROM THE SHOP - TEMPORARILY OUT OF SERVICE

Our shop is a rather unique situation, the equipment is subjected to a lot of wear and tear. This wear and tear is due to, wait for it, our members. Now calm down, let me explain. Of course our machines get more use than they would in a home shop, that's easy to see. While the board feet of lumber run through is much less than a commercial shop, our shop sees more changes in settings. Raising and lowering blades, changing router bits, drill bits, mortising chisels. Also changing planer or sander settings along with a wide

variety of woods. This constant changing results in wear on the mechanisms. And then there are the number of members using each machine, each with their own mannerisms and techniques. It's the difference between how long your lawn mower lasts if you are the only one who uses it compared to letting everyone in the neighborhood mow.

My point in this is to say that there will be times when tools in the shop will be out of service waiting for repair. That may be waiting on parts or just time for someone to fix it. The Foreman is not a maintenance position and they may not feel comfortable making repairs so there is some downtime. Please rest assured that we are tending to get the machine back on line as soon as we can.

I found a website that sells digital files for use on not only the laser, but also, the CNC. And the prices are quite reasonable, particularly if design bundles are purchased. Take a look www.DesignBundles.net. I've purchase a few files from MaWoodShop. The shop offers literally hundreds of files. There are other sellers offering many types of cutting files, spend some time looking around. All of the files are scalable, the only limit is the size of the laser or CNC bed. Files downloaded from DesignBundles may be used to make items to sell, just don't sell or giveaway the digital files.

Here's I've few items completed with the laser. These are all cut on 1/8" Baltic birch plywood. I posted some of the photos on Facebook and had several people want to buy a design. I plan to paint some and stain or dye others. There's no limit to the color schemes.

MAY MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW

Lathe

The lathe rotates workpiece about axis to permit shaping, sanding, and other operations. Lathes are used to create a wide variety of things, from pens to bowls and more.



Safety Rules

- 1. Select stock carefully and inspect it closely before undertaking a project. Avoid using wood with knots or splits.
- Rough out your workpiece van a band saw before mounting it on the lathe.
 When using the lathe, you must wear a full face shield in addition to your safety glasses with side shields.
- 4. Snug the tailstock center against the work and lock it. Lubricate the tailstock center if it is not a ball-bearing center.
- 5. Position the tool rest a little below center of the workpiece and no further than 1/8" from it. Stop the lathe periodically as you work to adjust the rest as the workpiece diameter decreases.
- 6. With the workpiece held in the lathe, rotate it by hand to be sure that it clears the tool
- Never adjust the position of the tool rest while the lathe is running.
- Before turning on the power to the lathe, make sure the lathe is set to the lowest possible speed and that the stock is secure. Stand to the side of the machine on the initial start-up in case the workpiece flies off the lathe as it gets up to speed.
- 9. Keep tools off the lathe bed. Keep the woodturning tools on your side of the lathe so you don't have to reach over the workpiece for them.
- 10. Keep the woodturning tools sharp. A dull chisel requires excessive feed pressure.
- 11. Hold the turning chisel firmly and brace it securely against the tool rest.
- 12. Make contact with the work cautiously, and then slowly make the cut more aggressive.
- 13. Don't use your fingers to check the work for roundness while the lathe is running, especially during roughing operations. Stop the lathe to check the progress, or rest the blade of the tool lightly against the work as it turns.
- 14. Clean up wood shavings and sawdust often. Sawdust can create a slipping hazard.
- 15. Remove the tool rest before sanding or polishing on the lathe.
- 16. When sanding, remember that the spinning stock will cause the sandpaper to heat up from friction. So sand on a low speed; sand on the back side of the stock.
