FROM THE SHOP

It's the start of the new year and I want to do a review. Not the tired review of the past year but a review of the rules of the shop. Rules you may not have heard since you took the Safety Orientation and rules that maybe you just were not aware of, but these are the rules of the shop. Once you have seen them, they cannot be unseen. Make a note of these rules and don't be that guy.

Rules reminders:

Safety Glasses are to be worn at all times while in the shop during Open Shop and training sessions. All Safety Glasses are eye glasses but not all eye glasses are Safety Glasses, Safety Glasses will have side shields and impact resistant lenses close fitting to protect your eyes from flying material. Just because you have plastic lenses does not mean they are safety glasses. Safety glasses and

goggles that have passed

impact testing required by ANSI Standard Z87. 1 are stamped "Z87." Make sure your eye protection has this marking! "Z87+" indicates that the eyewear is even more protective, having passed more stringent high-velocity impact testing. Safety Glasses are required and a good idea, especially if you don't have a spare set of eyes.

Pressure treated wood is not permitted to be processed in the shop. The sawdust from this chemically treated wood can be a strong irritant to someone with respiratory sensitivities. Since we do not know our members health conditions we will err on the side of safety.

No finishing in the Shop for the same reason we don't allow treated wood. In addition, we do not

have a dedicated space to provide for this work. That space would have ventilation, filtration, and fire suppression requirements that would not be justifiable for our space. As far as finishing goes, take it home.

Storage takes place in rented storage spaces, not in any nook or cranny that you think is out of the way. The drying tables by the coke machine are for glue ups and should be labeled with your name and date. You should take them off the table in the next Open Shop. All projects should be removed prior to the monthly meeting unless you're looking for that soda/ ice water/cookie crumb finish you saw on Instagram. If you are needing storage space contact storage@kcwg.net and Susan will let you know what is available and when.

Shop vacs, contrary to popular belief, are not a portal to another dimension. Everything you suck up is stored in the base of the vacuum. That space is finite and it fills up and needs to be emptied by someone (cough, you, cough). Sometimes a broom and a dustpan are the best solution to clean up a mess. Trash cans have to be emptied too, by the way.

Dust collectors are like big shop vacs, they fill up and they need to be emptied. Check to see if the red light is blinking, check to see if it is time to empty, especially if you are making a lot of chips. Please turn the dust collector on when using the connected machinery and turn the dust collector off when you are done if no one else is using a connected machine and you are not moving to another machine on the same dust collector.

Laser Engraver and CNC Router are special case machines. Before using these machines, you must receive additional training. Training can be arranged by attending the CNC SIG or Laser Engraving SIG respectively.

Gloves are not to be worn while operating machinery. The exception is the tight fitting exam type gloves. It's a safety thing, hands should not come in contact with cutting surfaces.

Scrap bin is not a trash bin. As woodworkers we hate to throw away wood, you might need a small piece. We can't keep everything; lord knows I've tried. Ask yourself a few questions before you add to the scrap bin. Would I keep it for myself had I not adopted a minimalist lifestyle? Could this be used for a project (We are not the WoodTurners Club, Pen Blank stock does not qualify)? A good rule of thumb is nothing shorter than 12" and nothing narrower than 2". The narrower the board the longer it should be. Plywood rippings are not desirable, the trashcan is a perfectly viable alternative.

Wide belt Sanders Are NOT Planers! Please! The widebelt sanders are finish sanders NOT thickness sanders. Light cuts are the rule. The sanders all have instructions. Please, **Read and Follow**.

The Resaw bandsaw is for resawing solid lumber at least 3 inches thick. It is not a sawmill, no bark, no pieces that don't sit solidly on the table. We want to keep this blade sharp and running true for quality resawing.




The 2022 financial data has been finalized and the budget for 2023

PRODUCT REVIEW ODIE'S OIL WOOD FINISH

I have recently started using Odie's Oil as a finish on several projects that I have built. After watching the owner of Odie's on YouTube, I was taken with how easy it is to apply. Additionally, I was also intrigued with the fact that it is a food-safe finish. A real bonus is that it smells really good too! My first use was on knife scales. It goes on easy, can be applied with your bare hands and polishes out quite nicely. My most recent project was using it on a couple of decorative planter boxes that I constructed out of Plyboo™ (bamboo plywood) for a local architect friend of mine.

According to Odie's Oil, the product is nontoxic, food safe (which means it can come in contact with food and have no adverse effects to the food) and it is so easy to apply. They have several products they offer that are penetrating oil products. Most of us sand up to 220 grit prior to finishing and Odie's suggests using a grey or white Scotch-Brite pad to apply their product. The grey pads are equivalent to a 220 grit sandpaper and the white pads are really not abrasive. Both work quite well in applying their penetrating oil products. Odie's has done a remarkable job posting highly informative videos about the use of their products on Instagram and YouTube. I learned about Odie's on Instagram due to following several folks who make cutting boards commercially. Another endearing quality of Odie's Oil is that all of their ingredients are nontoxic, solvent free and safe to use indoors without ventilation. On those occasions where I have been applying Odie's Oil to a project in my shop, I come in from the shop and my wife comments on how good it smells. I would have to agree... This stuff smells fantastic! More importantly, having used virtually every penetrating oil finish you can name, I have found Odie's Oil to be one of the best, if not THE best oil finish I have ever used. I have been a devout fan of Watco Danish Oil for as long as I can remember, but having



used Odie's Oil, I am a total convert. All I can say to those reading this review is to give it a try. You will not be sorry. Use Odie's Oil according to how they recommend using it, and you will be convinced. This is a product whose time has come. No VOC's, no toxicity, food safe and no special precautions for application. This is the best of all possible worlds. If you try it and don't like it, let me know and I will buy what you have left over. No questions asked. This is now my automatic "go-to" penetrating oil finish.

JANUARY MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW

Hand Tools

Compared to a lathe spinning at 4,000 RPM, hand tools may appear innocuous. And by and large, they are safer than power tools.

Nevertheless, they can hurt, as anyone who has hit a thumb with a hammer or gashed a hand with a knife can attest.



Safety rules

- 1. Use the right tool for the job and use it as it was designed to be used. Improvisation can lead to injury.
- 2. Make sure any edge tools you use knives, chisels, carving tools, planes, etc. are *sharp*. Dull edges require excessive force, and that can lead to accidents.
- 3. Carry pointed tools by your side with the points and heavy ends down.
- 4. Whenever possible, secure your workpiece with a vice or clamp.
- 5. Keep both hands behind the blade of a chisel or knife and out of the path of a saw. Don't cut toward any part of your body.
- 6. When you need to pull a knife to make a cut, make sure that you pull it to the side of your body.
