I've been absent for a couple of months due had the meeting preparations under control. ■to open heart surgery. A special thank you to Jon Lunde for making a laser engraved plague commemorating the event.



Additionally I want to thank my Rough to Ready instructors for stepping up to fill in class dates and covering my duties as R2R coordinator. I owe a very special thank you to Chuck Saunders for covering my foreman duties in both January & February since I was limited to lifting less than ten pounds. Finally I wish to thank the many members that sent get well messages. Those messages of encouragement meant a lot.

The evening of our February General Meeting we had a couple come in early and requested a tour of the Guild. I had some time available and Chris

As I took them on tour of the Guild shop they kept comparing us to another shop they had used. They seemed quite impressed with the quality and variety of equipment we offer at KCWG. As we concluded the tour I explained our costs and safety requirements.

In response to our annual membership fee, one of them inquired, "now that's per month or per session?" I replied; "no that's annually." Their reply was; "WHAT?, that's not each month?" They explained the other shop they had used was more each month than our annual costs. With additional charges for using some of the equipment.

Kevin Thomas wrote an article for Popular Woodworking, consequently Woodworking Guilds from other cities have reached out to the KCWG to learn how we accomplish all we do without a single paid employee.

Our Guild has the greatest volunteers in the country.

A Woodworkers Guild on the West Coast contacted KCWG. I looked at their website. They have over 1,000 members, they charge only \$75 per year. But they charge \$20 for a mandatory 4-hour safety orientation and they charge between \$150 for 4 hours of equipment usage, going up to \$600 per year to use their equipment.

KCWG charges less than \$10 per month which includes membership, safety orientation, and usage of Guild equipment. Even our Woodworker Plus membership is less than \$10.50 per month and provides a 20% discount on all Guild classes.





LASER ENGRAVER SIG

The Laser Engraver SIG meets the fourth Wednesday of the month at 7:00 pm. If you wish to be trained to use the laser engraver, join us at the meeting and we will do the required training immediately following the SIG.

In February we had a packed house as we met in the library to discuss successes and failures utilizing the laser engraver to enhance our woodworking projects.





is yes it has the capability but KCWG does not yet have the attachment. That possibility may be revisited at a later date.

Curtis demonstrated how to set up a project from start to finish using different engraving patterns in the laser to create varied effects in the final project.

Very basic settings for engraving are - speed: 350 mm per second; power max: 35%; power min: 30%. settings are adjusted per your materials. Very basic settings for cutting are - speed: 10 mm per second; power max: 70%; power min: 65% settings are adjusted per your materials.

If you have made something using the laser engraver, bring it for show 'n tell at the SIG meeting.






MARCH MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW


Router

A router is basically a motor that turns a cutter head at very high speed. It is used to perform an extensive range of smooth finishing and decorative cuts.

Safety Rules

- 1. Use sharp bits, inspect them before each use, and handle them with care. Never use dull or damaged bits or bits with cracked carbide.
- 2. Consult a speed chart for the correct speed setting for the bit.
- 3. Use only bits that have a cutting diameter less than the opening in the router base.





- Always use the wrenches provided with the tool to make adjustments.
- Be sure that the collet nut and any other adjustment devices are securely tightened before turning the router on. Loose adjustment devices can unexpectedly shift, causing loss of control; loose bits and collets may be thrown violently.
- 8. Make sure the work surface is free from nails, knots, and other foreign objects. Do not shape particleboard; it could fly apart while being routed.
- 9. Hold the workpiece securely in a vise or other clamping device. Holding the workpiece by hand is unstable and dangerous.
- 10. Follow the tool manufacturer's recommendation for the depth of cut.
- 11. Hold the router firmly with both hands. Motor torque can cause it to twist.
- 12. Feed the cut against the direction of bit rotation. Feeding the tool in the wrong direction causes the cutting edge of the bit to climb out of the workpiece and may cause loss of control.
- 13. Never lay the tool down until the motor and bit have come to a complete stop. The spinning bit can grab a surface and pull the tool out of your control.
- 14. Don't touch the bit immediately after use. It may be hot.
- 15. Return the bit to the bit holder located in the tool cabinet after use. Never store bits loose in a drawer.
