VICE-PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS

On March 29, three of our Guild Board Members and our Communication Director met via Zoom with principals from four other Woodworking Guilds from across the country, mostly as a result of Kevin Thomas' article in Fine Woodworking magazine.

Cal Hobbs, President; David Roth, Secretary; and Mike McCauley, Vice-President met via Zoom with representatives from St Louis, Milwaukee, Central California, and Oregon. A representative from Georgia had planned to join us, but was unable to make it.

I was surprised to discover there were so many guilds across the nation. After talking with these other groups, KCWG seems to be one of the most successful.

The big question everyone asked was how is KCWG so successful. Without a doubt, our success is due to all of our volunteers both past and present. Of course everyone at KCWG is a volunteer, from serving in a leadership position, to assisting as an instructor, to helping with a Guild project fundraiser. Our volunteers make the Guild work.

In our past, many members made bits, pieces, and parts at home, then bought those parts together to complete a project. The Andre's Chocolate project (to make Swiss Chalet style tables and chairs) gave KCWG the funding needed to start a guild shop with our own equipment. Guild leadership, at that time, had a vision to begin and increasingly grow to the shop we enjoy today.

Over the years there have been an assortment of fundraising projects that volunteers have helped build. These projects are for the benefit of everyone and to keep our costs less than \$10 per month with access to all our equipment.

One of the guilds we spoke with charge up to \$600 per year to use their shop and equipment. Another limits shop access time to just 4 hours (though I don't remember if that was monthly or yearly).

Since I mentioned our low dues, I should also mention that a dues increase will be necessary with our future move. Our landlord has indicated that our lease will probably not be renewed, but we actually have until May 2024. I believe any increase will still make our dues extremely affordable but will only serve to make our Guild a better place.

But I believe that the willingness of everyone to help and the camaraderie we enjoy is what makes our guild so successful and so much fun.

Whether attending the monthly meeting, enjoying the Show 'N Tell, the monthly programs, or working on a guild project and making new friends, or coming in the shop to build something and discovering a different way of considering how to complete your project, the guild is a FUN and interesting place to be.

Remember that you can volunteer by simply cleaning up after yourself after you use any of the equipment.

We enjoy something unique and wonderful here at KCWG, thanks to our volunteers and friendly knowledgeable members.

FROM THE SHOP

"Excuse me Foreman, I damaged one of the machines" (Said no one ever)

I got a text the other day from a Foreman telling me that when a member moved the fence back on the 16" jointer, that one of the "fingers" on the infeed table was bent up. Upon inspection, following the foot long scratch in the infeed table leads you right to the damaged finger and chipped insert. Wood doesn't do that. This did not happen without the operator knowing that something happened. I hear my sweet mother's voice in my head "Well, I guess we just can't have nice things". Accidents happen, I know that. A leading cause of "accidents" are mistakes. Mistakes are the result of not thinking through the process before hand. Not checking your wood for metal, not checking that the router bit cutting depth does not exceed material thickness for example. These mistakes result in chipped teeth on blades and holes/gouges/divots in bench













tops. Rob Young is getting to exercise his creative side using his Shaper Origin to repair bench damages. Let's just say he is getting way too much exercise.

The Guild has amassed an impressively equipped shop with many tools not commonly found in home shops as well as most every tool found in home shops. Unlike the

home shop with its one or two users we have hundreds of users. The tools take an impressive amount of wear and tear in normal everyday use. Please don't add misuse into the mix from carelessness. Remember that the tools in the shop represent a sizable investment (available for your use for minimal dues, we like





it that way). Hold vourself accountable to the tools use properly, and responsibly. Make vour investment in the Guild last a long time, you will be rewarded. **bv Chuck Saunders** Assets Director



LASER ENGRAVER SIG - APRIL 2023

Laser Engraver SIG meets the fourth Wednesday of the month at 7 PM. If you wish to be trained to use the laser engraver join us at the meeting and we will do the required training immediately following the SIG.

The first of April we again replaced the Red Light laser pointer. The position of the pointer has been changed for convenience to those authorized to adjust the pointer. The pointer is not lower than the nozzle and has been very precisely adjusted. Please do not move, adjust, nor damage the Red Light pointer.

Recently I was contacted by a foreman questioning, on behalf of a member, if anything other than wood could be engraved? The answer is NO! We are a Woodworkers Guild and only wood may be engraved or cut in our Laser Engraver.

The first of April we had a deadline to get the lids laser engraved for the turf-box project. Several members were disappointed that they could not use the laser engraver when they wanted to. Please remember that Guild projects take priority, especially if a deadline is involved. The turf-box project provided us the means to obtain the laser engraver and is why the laser engraver was purchased in the first place. There will be more laser engraving required once the build team get the additional turf boxes stained and lacquered. So there will be additional limits to open access of the laser engraver, exact time TBD.

A good rule to remember is your board must be flat, do not try to use a board larger than the engravers grid bed. The slight variation between the grid and the rail holding the grid will cause the laser to be out of focus and may cause the nozzle, red light pointer, or focusing sensor to drag across your wood, possibly damaging the laser or ruining your wood.

There are "Sticky Notes" on the desktop of the laser engraver computer, these are meant to convey important current information, please read them before utilizing

the laser engraver and DO NOT close them, the LightBurn software will launch right over the top of the sticky notes.

If you have made something using the laser engraver, bring it for show 'n tell at the SIG meeting, April 26 at 7:00pm.



APRIL 2023 - MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW Belt and Disk Sanders

These sanders are for surface or edge sanding of nonmetallic materials only. They may be used for many types of rough end-grain sanding and simple shaping.

shaping.

Safety Rules

1. Power driven sanders can cause serious

abrasive skin burns from accidental contact with the abrasive. Failure to keep your hands safely away from the abrasive may cause injury to the fingers and hands.

- 2. Before turning on the machine, check to make sure the sanding belt or disk is undamaged. Remove scrap pieces and other objects from the table, backstop and belt.
- 3. When you start a belt sander, make sure the belt tracks properly before beginning your sanding operation.
- 4. Keep the gap between the sander's table and the moving disk or belt as small as possible.
- 5. Be careful not to let the wood overheat. Sanding friction may burn the wood and damage or even destroy a belt.
- 6. Hold the workpiece firmly when sanding, and support the workpiece with the backstop or table or both. If your workpiece is too small to be safely supported, hold it in an appropriate jig or clamp.
- 7. Avoid awkward hand positions where a sudden slip could cause a hand to move into the sanding belt or disk.
- 8. When using a disk sander, hold the work firmly on the side of the table where the disk is rotating downward.
- 9. Do not push hard against the sanding medium. The sander performs best and most safely when it is allowed to remove material at a moderate rate.

This month the CNC SIG will meet at 6:30pm on Tuesday April 18th in the Guild Library. The CNC SIG is open to all Guild members and their guest.


The SIG meeting will have a time for "Show and Tell". Individuals can share their projects where the CNC was used. If you have a
