



THE COC ORIENTATION PROCESS

CNC SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP (SIG) WILL MEET ON THE 3RD MONDAY OF EACH MONTH AT 5:30 PM IN 2024



orientation with CNC you the Operating System and the safe operation the machine. For the orientation process you will be asked to produce several projects for machining on the CNC. You will then use the CNC to machine your project with the instructor offering direction and answering any questions you may have. When you can demonstrate an understanding of the steps to safely operate the machine you will receive your certification.

Projects for the CNC Orientation should be small, simple designs using one or two separate CNC bits. Keep in mind the main purpose of the orientation process is to acquaint you with the safe operation of the CNC machine, not to produce a museum quality piece or family heirloom. Each member of the Guild must supply their own CNC bits.

To receive certification, you must demonstrate: The ability to design a project using the CAD/CAM software (i.e. V-Carve Pro or Aspire). The ability to safely program the toolpaths

used in your project including bit feed and speed rates.

The ability to follow the instructions provided by the Guild to set up the machine for your project.

The ability to safely secure your workpiece to the CNC machine.

An understanding of the orientation of the CNC machine (X, Y and Z axis) as it relates to your project.

An understanding of "Work Offsets" and how and when to set them.

An understanding of the "Control Panel" and show the ability to navigate between sub menus.

The ability to set the "Z0 height" for either the machine bed or the top of your workpiece.

All of this may sound complicated; however, the Guild has step by step instructions to guide you through the process.

The CNC SIG will meet Monday July 15 at 6:30 PM in the Guild Classroom. All interested Guild members and their Guests are welcome.

WHAT IS IT WE REALLY BUILD?

At our latest first Friday's event I was working the booth within the Crossroads talking about our Guild and what we offer. You have an uncertain number of moments to get someone's attention and proselytize about the shop and our tools. These are shiny words that hopefully sparkle in just the right light as spoken. You hope they conjure or rekindle the desire to make, create or craft. Some people only need the names of the tool manufacturers or devices to be attracted or repelled. Some allow you to push further into what it means to join our organization.

We talked with hundreds of individuals as they passed the booth and as I started a conversation with a gentleman and his wife, I learned he was from Las Vegas. He informed me that he knew of our Guild and had occasion to look at our site as he was interested in what might be available while visiting Kansas City. He told me about his home shop and other interests. His memberships in other guilds and organizations around the country. And as the world shrank a bit I enquired if they would be in town the next day and suggested he visit our shop and the Seven Swans Creperie nearby. This is when he told me his next day would take him to Emporia Kansas.

My grandfather was a pharmacist in Emporia Kansas. He owned the Red X Pharmacy at 624 Commercial Street. This provided him a good livelihood and an even better place to build community. Within the store was a beautiful walnut soda fountain that served simple breakfast and lunch meals as well as the world's best cherry soda. Locals would meet there for coffee and a sandwich. My mother had lunch there in high school for 35 cents. She later married my father, the pharmacist's son.

I mentioned this history to the gentleman and his wife and he proceeded to tell me memories he had



up in Emporia. His father sold pharmaceuticals and they both were frequent visitors and clients. He even knew the street on which my grandfather's house still stands. As the conversation wound down, he introduced his son and daughter in law. They are locals and expressed an interest in visiting the Guild (and the creperie) as well.

This is what I love about our craft and our position therein. The connections and community we move within is so rich. We have 750 plus members at our current state. Many of them come to the shop to use the tools. I would venture that a large percentage come to enjoy and use the community. How many friendships do you count as a result of your membership? Do these friendships extend past our walls? How easy is it to find common ground with someone within the craft from other corners of the earth?

Oh, and we have some nice tools that are for use by the members as well.

Have you had a chance to talk with someone about the Guild and possible membership? Do you have your elevator/sidewalk speech ready? We build community.

SAFETY DIRECTOR'S NOTES

The month of July is a time when the summer season hits its stride. Many folks are vacationing and traveling, the baseball season is in full swing (pardon the pun), and as

> often as possible - families are spending as much time as they can near the edge of a cool lake, a spring-fed stream or a swimming pool. July is also the "tipping point" of the year when we

start to move toward the inevitable race to the holiday season and end of the year. This means that for many of us, we start to pick up the pace as we try to focus on woodworking projects we've planned to finish this year. With increased activity comes more potential for exposure to machine-related hazards in the shop.

With that in mind, let me provide a brief reminder of some of the key safety precautions for certain power tools that are commonly used for most projects. It is always a good idea to revisit some of the important safety principles from time to time.

Jointer

A jointer is used to make one face of a board flat, straight, and smooth and to make one adjacent edge flat, straight, and perpendicular to the jointed face. Key safety precautions for using these machines include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Joint stock that is at least 12 inches long and narrower than the cutting head.
- When jointing the face of a board, don't let your thumb or fingers hang over the back end to push it through the jointer. Always use a push block when operating the jointer. Use of hold-down devices is highly recommended.

Avoid applying pressure to the leading few inches of stock, since doing so may result in tipping the board or your fingers into the cutter at the start of the cut.

Table Saw

In previous issues of the Newsletter, I have covered critical safety precautions related to use of table saws very thoroughly, so I won't repeat that guidance here. However, I recently came across a piece on use of the table saw when ripping rough sawn lumber written by one of our Guild members, Mike Jones. Mike is one of our Shop Foreman. When he wrote this piece in the July 2021 Guild Newsletter, he was serving as the KCWG Director of Safety. My thanks and appreciation go out to Mike for raising the following issue. Please note his guidance for a potentially significant problem that can occur:

> I have noticed several people coming into the shop roughwith sawn lumber . . . and a problem, which can be all too typical, seems showing to be up. As people are processing their lumber, they encountering their tension in Вy boards. tension. I mean. as the material is being ripped,

the kerf is literally

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closing down on the riving knife, bogging down the saw and stopping the rip cut. I have personally experienced this issue when ripping long pieces of walnut stock. Boards that have remained untouched for months or even years may exhibit a tendency to start moving as soon as you start ripping or processing it. On several occasions. I have had to push the stock so hard, I couldn't push it through the cut any longer. The kerf had closed down so tightly on the riving, I literally stopped the cut. This is a dangerous condition because we all have a tendency to want to push the stock harder the more resistance we encounter. The inherent risk is that of having your hand slip and push it into the blade. I have found that the best strategy in these cases is to turn off the saw and find a small scrap of wood that will allow you to wedge it into the kerf behind the riving knife. . .. If you encounter this issue, and you're not confident to cut the wedge and remove the board yourself, please don't hesitate to call on your shop foreman for assistance.

In this same piece, Mike goes on to emphasize the importance of using the jointer to flatten and smooth one face and one edge of rough sawn lumber <u>before</u> attempting to rip it with the table saw.

Miter Saw and Sliding Compound Miter Saw

Miter saws are power tools used to make quick, accurate crosscuts and miter cuts. In the case of a compound miter saw, it can make simultaneous miter and bevel cuts. Although ours has not been installed yet in the new shop, a sliding compound miter saw like the one that will be used in the KCWG shop has rails for the motor head and blade assembly to travel on to allow cuts in wider stock. Key safety

precautions for using these machines include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Always hold the workpiece securely on the table and against the fence when making cuts. Always use clamps to hold the workpiece in place when the stock is so short that holding it would violate the 3-inch rule. Be aware of the risk of kickback.
- When cutting a cupped or bowed piece of stock, make sure the workpiece is oriented to leave no gap between it and the fence or the saw table at the point of the cut. If not, you risk pinching the blade and causing a kickback.
- Never reach under the saw blade or perform a cross-handed operation.
- When using a sliding compound miter saw like the ones in the shop, make you cut in three steps:
 - First pull the motor head out;
 - Then start the saw;
 - Finally, push the blade down into the stock and towards the fence to make the cut.

There are many more safety precautions for power tools use in the shop that could be focused on in this article, but time and newsletter space does not permit. Remember, follow all rules and safety precautions each and **every** time when using power tools. If you have questions about a power tool operation or are not confident about performing a high-risk operation with these or any other power tool, please connect with the shop foreman. They will help ensure the needed operation can be performed safely. Good luck with your woodworking projects during the

second half of the year and work safely!

Scroll Saw Compound Cutting

George Rexroad is offering a class to help members take their scroll saw skills to the next level. Compound

Cutting is a technique that involves cutting a block of wood on one face and then flipping it over to cut from an edge, resulting in a 3D image. Students in the class will be making their very own backscratchers!

I want to thank everyone who came out to the July Skill Builder. If you missed it, you missed a really interesting session. Barbara Akers presented the art of pyrography, and it was an extremely informative session. She showed us the different equipment available for pyrography (which have come a long way from the little woodburning sets that I used as a Boy Scout). She also demonstrated different techniques available and then provided an opportunity for the audience to try their own hand at it. I found that, like any other skill, this one takes some practice to get decent results.

Yet, Barbara also stated that she would be willing to teach a class on pyrography if there are people interested. So, if you think this is a skill that you'd like to learn, please let me know at dir.training@kcwg.net.

Speaking of Skill Builder sessions, we also have a very interesting Skill Builder coming up August 3, 2-4 pm. Terry Johnson will be presenting on the process of making stained glass and how woodworkers might use this technique to enhance their woodworking projects. This is yet another opportunity for woodworkers to develop their skills.

In addition to the Skill Builders, I am really excited to announce that there are several upcoming classes that will open for enrollment in the This class will meet on Saturday, August 17, 9 am – 1 pm. Enrollment just started on Tuesday, **July 9**. There may still be seats available.

Introduction to Kumiko

Wayne Peterson is once again going to offer his popular Introduction to Kumiko class. As Wayne describes, "Kumiko involves making decorative patterns with thin strips of wood. It was traditionally used in Japanese Shoji (a screen or sliding door that can be used as a partition or wall). In this class, we will create a single Asa-no-ha pattern. Once the techniques are mastered it opens the possibility of additional patterns and possibilities to enhance your woodworking projects."

If you've ever thought about learning Kumiko, this is the class for you. The class meets on Saturday, August 24, 9 am – 2 pm. Enrollment starts Tuesday, **July 16**.

Intermediate Woodworking

The popular Intermediate Woodworking class is once again going to be offered. This is a 10-week, fast-paced class that has been designed to be a continuation of the Basic Woodworking class. Participants will make a Shaker side table and wall cabinet. But more importantly, Intermediate

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Woodworking focuses on developing skills and techniques in woodworking beyond the basic course. All students must have taken the Basic class before taking Intermediate Woodworking.

The class meets on Thursday evenings (September 12-November 21), 7 -10 pm. Enrollment starts on **July 23**.

Hand Tool Woodworking

This is another very popular class with a fantastic and knowledgeable team of instructors. This 10week class is designed to acquaint woodworkers with the use of classical hand tools such as planes, saws, chisels, and drills that were in common usage before the current power tool availability. This is a great class to enhance one's skills with hand tools whether they want to use hand tools exclusively or just as a way to fine-tune their projects. This class also meets on Thursday evenings (September 12-November 21), 7 -10 pm. Enrollment starts on **July 23**.

Bandsaw Box

Last, George Rexroad is also going to offer his Bandsaw Box class. This beginner+ class will focus on the gluing up of a block and the making of a traditional bandsaw box. The box will feature different material types to create a decorative box. This class meets for two sessions. On Friday, September 20, 6-8 pm, participants will come in to glue up the block. Then, they'll return the next morning (Saturday, September 21, 9 am -1 pm) to cut out the box. This is a good course to become familiar with the bandsaw. Enrollment starts August 13.

was in the shop working at the scroll saw on a project and I barely noticed that a member had brought in a bunch of construction lumber and spent a lot of time at the planer. That's not a problem, of course, but the problem is that when he finished what he was doing, he picked up his wood and left. I noticed later that the chip bin under the collector was overflowing with what looked like softwood shavings.

None of the foremen or ladies are paid to clean up after you. Personally, I cannot lift a full can of shavings high enough to get it dumped into the dumpster, so the foreman on duty that day had to do it.

I highly recommend that once you are finished jointing and/or using a planer, that you take a walk back to where the shavings are collected and empty the can while it is still less than half full. Even I can lift that small load, but when I am foreman, I will ask you to empty the can. I'll help by showing you where a hand truck is so that you can easily move the can to the dumpster without having to drag it on the floor or even lift it and get dusty. I'll even open the dumpster for you and help you lift it if you need help, but I really encourage you to be considerate of other members and clean up after yourself. It's the right thing to do, especially in our woodworking community of volunteers.

JULY SAFETY REVIEW

Hand Tools

Compared to a lathe spinning at 4,000 RPM, hand tools may appear innocuous. And by and large, they are safer than power tools. Nevertheless, they can hurt, as anyone who has hit a thumb with a hammer or gashed a hand with a knife can attest.



Safety rules

- 1. Use the right tool for the job and use it as it was designed to be used. Improvisation can lead to injury.
- 2. Make sure any edge tools you use knives, chisels, carving tools, planes, etc. are *sharp*. Dull edges require excessive force, and that can lead to accidents.
- 3. Carry pointed tools by your side with the points and heavy ends down.
- 4. Whenever possible, secure your workpiece with a vice or clamp.
- 5. Keep both hands behind the blade of a chisel or knife and out of the path of a saw. Don't cut toward any part of your body.
- 6. When you need to pull a knife to make a cut, make sure that you pull it to the side of your body.
