HOUSEKEEPING AND SHOP SAFETY

ecently I was working in the shop, and I Dobserved a member of the Guild working at one of the hollow chisel mortisers. He was running several large mortises for a furniture piece made of white oak. As one can imagine, there were a great deal of shavings and chips that had fallen onto the machine and the floor beneath the mortiser. For a split second as I walked by, I wondered if the worker was planning to clean up properly when he was finished. I then became focused on my own project and didn't give the matter much more thought as I went on my way. A little while later, as I walked by again, I noticed the Guild member engaged in the process of thoroughly cleaning up the work area using a horsehair bench/counter brush and a shop vacuum. My fleeting questions as to whether proper cleanup would occur evaporated. But I began to think about the number of times I have stepped up to a machine to set up and start working, only to find that the person(s) using the machine before me did not clean up after they had finished. This seems to be most common with the sliding miter saw and the table saws, but this situation applies to other work areas in the shop as well. Sawdust and

Poor housekeeping has safety-related implications. Data show that in general industry, poor housekeeping is a key causal factor in 35% of accidents, the majority of which are slips and falls. Of course, the KCWG does not

fall under the general industry classification. But when you think about it, the potential exposures in the shop are virtually the same as those found in the many small businesses that fall under the general industry classification – we have a dense collection of machinery and power tools (associated with high severity accident potential) that generate debris that can accumulate at points where workers have to interact with the machine or tool. The material point is – housekeeping has the potential to increase risk of injury to our population. As a volunteer organization of amateur enthusiasts, it behooves us to be vigilant around this key safety principle much as is done in regulated businesses where strong safety cultures have been established.

The KCWG Shop Wide Safety Rules state, "Clean up. When you are through with any machine or hand tool, clean the work area with brush, broom and dustpan or vacuum, and put away whatever you took out. (Yes, this is a safety issue as well as a courtesy)." The Guild has put a lot of effort into acquiring and installing effective dust collection systems for our machinery and equipment. These systems do a very good job of controlling dust and capturing chip emissions. But like any mechanical system of this nature, they are not one hundred percent efficient. We all need to do our part to supplement the efficacy of these systems. Professional experience has shown that the benefits of good housekeeping include:

- Elimination of clutter, which makes for a safer work environment.
- Reduction in the likelihood of fire or explosion (wood dust is classified as combustible dust. Under certain circumstances can lead to what is called a 'deflagration.').
- Limiting airborne exposure to particulate that can be inhaled into workers' airways.
- Improves productivity we can all finish our projects faster and with more accuracy.

Many of us know all too well, preparing to use a machine to begin working, and then finding that the person(s) who previously used the machine did not clean up after they had finished is an annoyance. It also shows disrespect for the Guild and for our fellow Guild members. Not to be too "preachy" about this - cleaning up after oneself is not the Shop Foreman's job or something that the next person should take care of. We all use the shop equipment during Open Shop Hours. We all need to do our part to leave the place as clean – or cleaner – than when we first found it.

Please make it a point to develop the habit of cleaning up after you're finished at a machine or using a power tool. Best practice is to clean up after you're finished using a machine and before you move to the bench or on to another machine. This is not always feasible, but most of us could be

better at this than we often are.

Many years ago I used to work with a very wise Senior Facility Manager with oversight responsibility for a large organization. He used to say that "Housekeeping is the mother of Safety programming." I am not sure that I agree entirely with his opinion because establishing and maintaining an excellent safety culture is extremely complex and involves many important factors. However, his point was well taken - housekeeping is certainly vital to overall safety. Please help all of us make housekeeping a strength within the KCWG culture.



FROM THE SHOP

T'm going to let you in on one of the worst kept secrets and hopefully the word will spread. Ready? (The guild is an all volunteer run organization). You hear that but what does that mean? It means that your dues that you pay do not go into any of our pockets. I know that with the move to our new space came a drastic increase in our dues. Know that one reason the cost isn't more is that our labor cost is low, real low, like \$0.00. As our Assistant Carole Shelton pointed Membership Director out our dues for Sawdust Maker level is \$16.50 a month. Not totally unreasonable considering a HiBoy Double Cheeseburger and a regular shake will run you the same amount. I know, it used to be less. When I first joined the dues were \$15, things change over time (who knew?) and I hope you feel there have been improvements.

Membership in the Guild is different from other memberships you may hold. I hope that you see the Guild as a community of enthusiasts that have a well-equipped shop as an added feature. Different from say, a gym membership and not just because you still come to the Guild shop after your first 3 months. The gym membership is a well-equipped

gym staffed by employees. You

may get to know some of the other customers but generally everyone is there to come in, do their workout, and leave.

Other than wiping down the equipment when you finish, you aren't really expected to pitch in and take out the trash, help repaint the walls, or vacuum the carnet. The dues you

the walls, or vacuum the carpet. The dues you pay are calculated to cover the cost of hiring staff or contractors to do this work. The Guild is a collective where the membership


is the management, staffing, marketing and operations. Total payroll = \$0. Our goal is to make the woodworking craft accessible by providing the community and facility necessary to provide as minimal a barrier to entry as possible.

We try our best to keep our dues as low as possible. By having the membership power the Guild we not only avoid the overhead of salaries but the membership is intimately involved in the growth and direction of the Guild. Operations costs are also assisted through our fund raising efforts. You know these fund-raising efforts by names like TurfBox, Award Plagues, Floor Samples and others. I hope you see where I'm going with this column. The Guild needs your help on these projects. When you see the email announcing signups, I encourage you to try to sign up. We all benefit from the funds these projects generate and we should all pitch in. Dues will continue to rise over time but contributing your time to these projects can lessen the jump the dues take. As a plus you get to meet more members of the Guild and may pick up some woodworking skills with our materials instead of your own making you a better woodworker, and who doesn't want that?

When we have these projects, we call on our membership for assistance (that's you). The costs are pretty much the same, you can cover the total cost with your dues, or you can pitch in and volunteer on the fund-raising projects.

of the small CNC. Numerous problems were found in the machine including a motor with a bearing that had failed, an electrical connector that had overheated and as a result was making intermittent connection as well as some software issues. Also, a cooling fan had failed which resulted in failure of the power supply.

Hopefully all of the problems have been found and will soon be resolved and the Explorer CNC will be returning to the Guild in a few weeks.

When the Explorer CNC returns those individuals that had been certified to use it will need to recertify. This recertification is necessary since

the machine has been out of service for so long that it is felt a quick refresher will protect the machine and give the Guild members a chance to reacquaint themselves with its safe operation.



LIBRARY - OCTOBER 2024


The Library now has a dvd from the "About" tab player and a scanner. You can watch a dvd or scan a few pages fron a book. The scanned file can be saved to your thumb drive or printed to the printer in the classroom. You can also save pages from the magazine digital archives (on the Library computer) to your thumb drive. We are still developing step by step instructions to use the online catalog, check out books, and search the digital magazine collections.

You can check out books using the Library computer or use the binder near the computer where you can enter your name, member number (back of your name badge), Title of the book, and the call number. You can search the online catalog at home. You can use your web browser to view the Library book and dvd catalog online by going to the Guild website (kcwg.net) home page and clicking "Resources"

OCTOBER MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW

Safety Rules

1. Use sharp bits, inspect them before each use, and handle them with care. Never use dull or damaged bits or bits with cracked carbide.

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- 2. Consult a speed chart for the correct speed setting for the bit.
- 3. Use only bits that have a cutting diameter less than the opening in the router base.



- 4. Unplug the router when changing a bit.
- 5. When changing a router bit, insert the new bit as far into the collet as possible, then withdraw it about 3/16" before tightening the collet. Make sure that the bit shaft is engaged in the collet at least ½".
- 6. Always use the wrenches provided with the tool to make adjustments.
- Be sure that the collet nut and any other adjustment devices are securely tightened before turning the router on. Loose adjustment devices can unexpectedly shift, causing loss of control; loose bits and collets may be thrown violently.
- Make sure the work surface is free from nails, knots, and other foreign objects. Do not shape particleboard; it could fly apart while being routed.
- Hold the workpiece securely in a vise or other clamping device. Holding the workpiece by hand is unstable and dangerous.
- 10. Follow the tool manufacturer's recommendation for the depth of cut.
- 11. Hold the router firmly with both hands. Motor torque can cause it to twist.
- 12. Feed the cut against the direction of bit rotation. Feeding the tool in the wrong direction causes the cutting edge of the bit to climb out of the workpiece and may cause loss of control.
- 13. Never lay the tool down until the motor and bit have come to a complete stop. The spinning bit can grab a surface and pull the tool out of your control.
- 14. Don't touch the bit immediately after use. It may be hot.
- 15. Return the bit to the bit holder located in the tool cabinet after use. Never store bits loose in a drawer.
