A MASTERCLASS IN WOODWORKING: THE LIE-NIELSEN PRESENTATION



Members wishing to use the Explorer will need to undergo certification for this machine even if they had previously used it. Certification is machine specific, meaning members are allowed to use only the machine they have had the specific training for. Members may be certified for either or both CNCs.

Both CNCs will now be padlocked when not in use. Members wishing to use either machine will need to obtain the key from the Shop Foreman and then return it to the Foreman when they have completed using the machine. Please do not remove the key to the CNCs from the shop.

The final CNCSIG for 2024 will be Monday November 18 at 6:30pm in the Guild Classroom. Planned is a "Show and Tell" opportunity where members can display and discuss projects they have worked on that involved using the CNC. Also, we will have an open question and answer period where any subject relating to the CNC may be asked and hopefully a suitable answer will be provided by those in attendance. A short presentation on getting started with the CNC will also be made.

REMEMBERING JOHN TEGELER

John Tegeler in the Kansas City Woodworkers Guild

The sources, newsletters from the Kansas City Woodworkers Guild from 2005 to 2024, mention John Tegeler several times. They show him steadily increasing his participation in the Guild over time.

December 2007: John is mentioned for the first time as winning a set of Wilton clamps in the raffle. He also brought his "first box project" to show-and-tell. The box was made from maple with walnut trim and finished with a wipe-on oil finish. **June 2008**: John built a recipe box from Baltic birch and finished it with Watco oil. He brought the box to show-and-tell.

2008: Julv John helped assemble the tables for the Andre's Table and Bench project. The newsletter writer, Shelly Taylor, notes, "I'm sure John Johnson will have some great tips for anyone who wants to take on the role of managing our next project!" This suggests that John Tegeler, along with John Johnson and Kevin McAndrew, was closely involved in managing this large-scale project.

July 2008: John Tegeler is the Member of the Month. The newsletter includes a photo of John and a brief interview about his woodworking experience. He started woodworking in 1955 in junior high shop class and rekindled his interest upon

retirement. He enjoys making small boxes and is currently working on two small boxes with handles. His favorite Guild activity is "networking and learning from my peers at the meetings," especially the "tips, help, wisdom, and most of all the support" from the members. He emphasizes the importance of shop safety, recommending doing a "dry run" with a new project before turning on any equipment.

September 2008: John built a Tic-Tac-Toe board out of pine with a Watco oil finish. He brought it to Show-and-Tell. The board is actually a box that holds the game pieces. The lid is inverted to create the playing surface. John based the design of the pegs on the game's history. He learned that Tic-Tac-Toe was originally created to help children develop motor skills.

October 2008: John reconnected with Terry Brown at their 50th high school reunion. He learned that Terry has been a woodworker for 20 years. John brought Terry to the October Guild meeting.

Key Observations:

The sources highlight John's commitment to learning new techniques and developing his woodworking skills.

His projects, small boxes and games, demonstrate an interest in creating functional and enjoyable items.

He seems to enjoy participating in

retirement. He enjoys making the Guild community, attending small boxes and is currently meetings, showing his work, and working on two small boxes bringing new people into the with handles. His favorite Guild Guild.

John Tegeler aka "Mr. Radial Arm Saw" is introduced in the February 2009 newsletter in a serialized story titled "Stories of a Woodworker". The story chronicles his rediscovery of his Craftsman radial arm saw after retirement.

In the March 2009 newsletter, the "Stories of a Woodworker" series continues with Tegeler reflecting on purchasing the radial arm saw in 1972.

The May 2009 newsletter contains Chapter 3 of Tegeler's story, titled "Christmas in February." It describes his experience volunteering at the 2008 Wood Workers Show and purchasing a router table.

Tegeler's name appears in a list of individuals who donated items to the June 2009 Guild meeting raffle.

He is listed as having displayed band saw boxes at the June 2009 meeting's "Show and Tell" segment.

Tegeler continues his "Stories of a Woodworker" series in the June 2009 newsletter, recounting his time working on a project at

the Guild shop.

The September 2009 newsletter includes a safety tip from Tegeler: "Wear your hearing protection". Tegeler is mentioned as potentially participating in the November 2009 Scroll Saw SIG meeting.

The January 2010 newsletter highlights that Tegeler won first prize in the Fine Woodworking Holiday Gift Contest for his jewelry boxes designed to look like books.

The January 2012 newsletter mentions Tegeler as the Hand Tool SIG reporter and provides a report on a meeting about rabbeting tools.

Tegeler is mentioned as discussing a potential field trip for the Scroll Saw SIG to attend annual meetings in May and June.

He is noted as leading a handson Scroll Saw workshop on August 25, 2012, covering the history, equipment, and blades of scroll saws.

Tegeler presented a Carter Mag Fence review at the August 2012 Power Tool SIG meeting.

Several images of projects by John Tegeler are included in the August 2012 newsletter.

The sources illustrate John Tegeler's active involvement in the Kansas City Woodworkers Guild, his journey as a woodworker, and his contributions to the Guild through workshops, presentations, and project displays.

References to John Tegeler in the Sources

John Tegeler is mentioned numerous times throughout the provided sources, mainly in relation to his involvement with the Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild (KCWG), particularly the Scroll Saw Special Interest Group (SIG). Here's a summary of his activities, based on the information available:

He frequently participated in the "Show and Tell" portion of Scroll Saw SIG meetings, showcasing his projects, such as an earring and necklace box and an "Old Guys Rule" plaque.

Other Roles and Activities

Cub Reporter: He was listed as the "Cub Reporter" for the *Wood Words* newsletter, suggesting he contributed articles or gathered information for the publication. However, no specific articles attributed to him are found within the provided excerpts.

Shop Safety Training: He was involved in critiquing the scroll saw safety test during a Scroll Saw SIG meeting in August 2014. General Observations

Active Member: John Tegeler appears to have been a highly active and engaged member of the KCWG, contributing his time and skills to various activities, particularly those related to the Scroll Saw SIG.

Passion for Scroll Sawing:

information on Tegeler's background, his specific woodworking expertise, his projects beyond those mentioned in "Show and Tell." To learn more about him, you might need consult other sources, such as additional KCWG publications, interviews with members, or online resources related to woodworking.

Here are all the references to John Tegeler in the provided sources:

April 2018: John Tegeler presented a box made of Baltic Birch with a Danish Oil finish at the March Show & Tell.

June 2018: John Tegeler presented a piano music stand made of Baltic Birch with a Poly Urethane finish at the May Show & Tell.

John Tegeler's Projects

John Tegeler is featured in the "Member Projects" section of the August 2022 Wood Words newsletter. He created several projects, all of which are pictured in the newsletter:

- 1 **Octopus Puzzle:** Made from 3/4" plywood and finished with miscellaneous materials.
- 2 **Other Puzzles:** The newsletter mentions other puzzles made by John Tegeler but doesn't provide details about their construction.
- 3 **John Tegeler's "OWL**

Medallion" The April 2022 Wood Words also includes John Tegeler in its "Member Projects" section. He crafted an "OWL Medallion" from 1/8" Baltic birch, highlighting scroll saw work.

4 This information suggests that John Tegeler is an active member of the Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild who enjoys creating a variety of projects, particularly puzzles, using different woodworking techniques.

THE MOST IMPORTANT SAFETY DEVICE

With the help of Mike Blake (Guild member and Shop Foreman) and Bill Mantia (Guild member and avid videographer), the KCWG Safety Committee recently wrapped up shooting for our latest safety video. This video focuses on *Personal Safety* and *General Shop Safety Rules*.

Chuck Saunders, our Director of Assets, did an excellent job writing the video script. There is a line or two in his script that refers to the importance of everyone utilizing one of the most important safety devices – the human brain. The video narrative frames it up this way:

"Make sure you **think** about safety. only work in the shop when you're focused on working in the shop. If you're preoccupied with issues at work or home, you're not giving life-threatening machines and power tools vour undivided attention."

Having spent my professional life as a health and safety professional, I can assure you that the safety profession has a strong preference for safety devices and technology that are to be

implemented to protect workers <u>without</u> them having to think much at all about their personal safety. This seems to be counter intuitive, in the safety profession these types of countermeasures are referred to as "Engineered Safeguards," which means that the machine, power tool, or system has been designed to help "Error-Proof" the equipment so that hazards are effectively "engineered out" of the equation without much decision making on the

part of the person using a machine or power tool. Examples of engineered safeguards include things such as a machine guard that physically prevents someone from accessing a machine danger zone, or a specially designed safety interlock that does not allow a machine or system to operate when the interlock is in the open position. Although nothing is 100 percent foolproof, use of engineered safeguards is a very reliable approach to ensuring operator safety when using machinery. However, use of effective engineered safeguards is very complicated, requiring a great deal of sophisticated design that has undergone robust testing. Many of the machines at the KCWG feature various types of engineered safeguards to protect us from machine-related hazards. Yet, the challenge for us at the Guild is that much of the time, we need to perform woodworking operations that require us to engage in close interaction with what we call "point of operation" hazards (this refers to the point at which a blade, bit, or knife contacts the stock to rip, crosscut, or shape the piece.).

Think about it – most of what we do at the shop involves a reductive process to rip, crosscut, or shape one or more pieces of hardwood in order for us to create a piece of furniture or a piece of art. These are necessary actions that we all perform in pursuit of the craft we love so much. In these cases, we can't always rely on an engineered safeguard to protect us from the point-of-operation hazard because of the nature of the operation we need to perform. We must rely on one of the most important safety devices – our brains – as our primary safeguarding approach. This means that we, as a woodworking community, need to develop and follow safety rules, procedures, or rely on providing training that helps make us aware of machine hazards and provides safe work practices that we are to follow to avoid injury. Rules, procedures, and training are referred to as "Administrative Safeguards." And as good as

administrative safeguards may be – they are much weaker than engineered safeguards because they rely on a "people" component. As woodworkers, we need to understand the rules, procedures, or training and it is vitally important for us to always be present, focused, and to **think** about following them before performing work. Just having a well written safety rule, procedure, work practice, or having effective training does **not** physically keep your fingers, hands, or other body parts from making contact with a blade, bit, or tool!

So again, this is where Chuck's admonition to use your brain to focus on following rules, procedures, and training - to the letter - each time you interact with a machine or power tool. During Safety Orientation sessions with new Guild members, I like to emphasize the necessity of learning to use machinery and tools safely and follow safe work

practices <u>each and every time</u> we use the equipment. Use your brain – stay safe!!

PRAISE FOR THE SCROLL SAW

Liver since we got our laser cutter machine, some folks who may have normally used a scroll saw to cut intricate patterns in thin wood have used the scroll saws less often. I suspect that many of us think of the scroll saw being used almost exclusively to cut intricate patterns. You can talk with George Rexroad and you will discover that there are several other great uses for scroll saws.

In fact, George will visit with us about the many applications for a scroll saw plus inform us about the details that we should know about to make the best use. For example, because it can turn extremely tight radii, it is perfect for making puzzles. George has made at least several hundred puzzles, many of which he gives to friends for their grandchildren. I have used the saws for cutting out the patterns in my yarn bowls which also can be used for luminaries. We also have used them in classes where we made



exquisite boxes with marquetry patterns on the lids. Scroll saw blades make much smoother cuts then a bandsaw and can turn a much

tighter radus

A key issue is to be aware of the proper saw blade to use. I can use a heavier blade to cut my yarn bowl patterns because I am cutting through more than a half inch of wood and I have to use a finer blade to cut marquetry patterns through a dozen sheets of fine veneer. As we all know, you need to know the proper tool to use to get the best results and George has the years of experience to know one blade from another and when to use them.

Some folks love sitting at the saw and getting into an almost zen-like rhythm and cutting out those intricate patterns. You can definitely get into the zone where the rest of the world disappears for a while. Nothing wrong with that. Even if you prefer to sit at the laser until it burns through all your patterns instead of cutting them yourself, you should be aware of the potential opportunities you have for woodworking by using the scroll saws. Besides, they have the best location in the shop because they all line up at the windows.




NOVEMBER 2024 - SAFETY REVIEW

Belt and Disc Sanders

These sanders are for surface or edge sanding of nonmetallic materials only. They may be used for many types of rough end-grain sanding and simple shaping.

Safety Rules




- 2. Before turning on the machine, check to make sure the sanding belt or disk is undamaged. Remove scrap pieces and other objects from the table, backstop and belt.
- 3. When you start a belt sander, make sure the belt tracks properly before beginning your sanding operation.
- 4. Keep the gap between the sander's table and the moving disk or belt as small as possible.
- 5. Be careful not to let the wood overheat. Sanding friction may burn the wood and damage or even destroy a belt.
- 6. Hold the workpiece firmly when sanding, and support the workpiece with the backstop or table or both. If your workpiece is too small to be safely supported, hold it in an appropriate jig or clamp.
- 7. Avoid awkward hand positions where a sudden slip could cause a hand to move into the sanding belt or disk.
- 8. When using a disk sander, hold the work firmly on the side of the table where the disk is rotating downward.
- 9. Do not push hard against the sanding medium. The sander performs best and most safely when it is allowed to remove material at a moderate rate.

I may try different descriptions of the project that may include adjectives such as free plans, DIY, or a style such as Shaker, Craftsman, or Greene & Greene.

A separate item that may be of interest, a newer member (since this spring) is also a ceramic artist



Always check the Guild website before leaving home to be sure that a scheduled event is actually taking place.

There will also be times when the shop will be closed to open shop periods due to a special meeting, class or event. These closures will be clearly noted on the monthly open shop schedule and are typically highlighted by a color other than the green backgound that normally indicates an open shop period.
