FROM THE SHOP

Fime for a few reminders in the shop today. Sometimes we forget the easy stuff and a gentle reminder puts us back on track. Follow along and let these items jog your memory, it will be like exercise.

Let's start with the shop stools, their home is in the front shop area. Does that mean you can't sit on a stool while you cut out your parts on the bandsaw in the back room? Of course not, but when you finish bring the stool back. Don't leave it as a courtesy for the next instead person. return the stool to where the next person expects the stools to

be.

We have 2 different types of shop-vacs, the yellow Dewalt shop-vacs are for pairing with tools like the Festool Domino, and the orange Rigid shopvacs are for general cleanup. Remember that the shop-vacs store all the material you suck up in the vacuum, it does not transport the material into the 4th dimension gone forever. Due to this limitation the shop-vacs need to be emptied on occasion. This is a simple task available to all, even you. Again, return them to their rightful place when finished.

Heck, while we're cleaning up don't cheat yourself and let someone else clean up after you. Beat them to the punch and clean up your mess first. And just so you know, everyone is allowed to empty the trash cans, no really, anyone. I know, you thought it was just for the chosen few.

As you know there is not an unlimited amount of space in the shop and a lot of members use the shop. That does mean that you can't leave your project on the bench until you can come back to it. You have to put it away. If you don't have a storage space in the storage area (for good storage email **storage@kcwg.net**) then you have to take it home. Do not, I repeat Do NOT just look for an out of the way place to stash your project. We will find your project and it will find the scrap bin where it will be consumed almost immediately. Of course if you are gluing something up and will be back the next day, ask the Foreman for direction. If you are working at the end of the Open Shop period and will be returning at the BEGINNING of the next Open Shop consult the Shop Foreman. If there is not a meeting, class or other event taking place before the next Open Shop you May be able to leave your project on the bench. Ask The Foreman.

Finally, remember that this shop is used by many members and everyone wants to have the most productive and enjoyable time that they can. If you see something, Say something. Let the Foreman know if a tool is not operating properly or is missing anything, or has a dull blade or needs any other attention. If you get a chisel out and find it needs sharpening, sharpen it, don't just put it back and grab another one. Take care of the shop and treat the tools well so that you will be treated well by the tools.


DRUM ROLL please!

IMMEDIATE LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE POSITION OPENINGS

As the Guild continues to grow we are finding that members of our the Guild's Leadership Committee, at times, find themselves with work loads that begin to inhibit their ability as a volunteer to easily manage all of the demands on their time.

As a result of this the Guild's Constitution, By-Laws and Policies provide for each of the Leadership Committee Members to appoint an assistant Leadership Committee Director to help them with the duties of their position. These assistants currently exist under a few of the current LC Directors but the Board of Directors has mandated that Directors without assistants begin to fill the position in their area of responsibility. STORAGE UPDATE

It's renewal season, so it's a good time to update you on how the whole 'storage in the new space' situation is going.

The prices will not change: The top (e.g. 1) and bottom (5) bins are \$75 for the year, and it's \$110 for the 3 in the middle, (2,3,4). You'll be receiving an invoice from PayPal. You do not need a PayPal account to use this option. You can also pay in person at the Guild - give a check or cash to the foreman. You can also use a credit card (but then you have to find someone who knows how to use the swipe machine).

I am also converting some spaces to a different layout. The spaces as originally configured are 49" wide and 42" deep. Some people find that dimension limiting for storing long boards, although depending on the kind of work you do, it works fine. So, in this new additional layout, you use one half of two back-to-back spaces which are now split down the middle, making the individual spaces in this new configuration 24" wide and 84" deep, so same square footage but longer proportion. (A working example of this is B3/C3). You access your space from both ends - the access is just as big. This can't/doesn't apply to the A row, by the way.

Hello, all! Hey, long time no send you a quippy I am planning to continue converting some spaces to this new deep configuration as it is proving to this new deep configuration, as it is proving popular. I want to have options of both layouts. If your spot is filled and you are happy with the arrangement, I'll leave well enough alone. Although depending on what's across from you and how stuffed your space isn't. I might be contacting you about converting it.

> Incidentally and of course, some people, um, blur the line between their spaces and the one next to them, and gradually their wood is stored in your space. (This happens in either configuration). You can let me know if there's an issue - I will happily, and maybe even effectively, play the Bad Cop.

> So, back to renewal. I'll be sending invoices to all current storage renters for renewal in the coming weeks. Renewal deadline is end of January, after which the space will be cleared and available for others to rent. If you are not planning to renew, please let me know and I won't pester you.



ROUGH TO READY INSTRUCTORS NEEDED!

Many Guild members reading this article received their Green Badge by completing a Rough to Ready (R2R) class. For some, this may have been your first experience using powered



equipment for woodworking. For others, the course was a great refresher on how to safely use many of the tools at the Guild. You were able to take the class because someone volunteered to teach it! We are now asking <u>you</u> to consider becoming a Rough to Ready Instructor. Guild membership is on the rise, and that's great! Consequently, the demand for R2R class sessions is increasing also. Unfortunately, for various personal reasons, we don't currently have enough R2R Instructors to offer R2R classes that fit the schedule of all our members who want to take the class.

Each R2R class is open to one or two students. In the class, they learn to build a wooden box with an experienced instructor. As the student progresses through the process of building their box, the instructor discusses the safety considerations of each machine and gives the student the opportunity to operate the equipment safely and successfully.

We think you would find being an R2R Instructor to be a very rewarding experience. As an instructor, you may be the first individual with whom the new member has face-to-face contact! You meet individuals from all walks of life and at all levels of woodworking experience. Students has said they thought they would just cut a few boards, and that would be it. They are very pleased when they see their box coming together. Students express their surprise at the results of their box-making experience with words like, "I can't believe I just made that!"

To become an R2R Instructor, please contact either of the R2R Co-Coordinators – John Sloss or Ed Stewart and as a new Instructor, you'll be paired with one or two of our experienced Instructors for your "audit" experience, while they are teaching a class. Then, when you are comfortable with the course methodology, you will pick dates you wish to teach R2R, and those dates will be placed on the *Signup Genius* R2R schedule. Classes typically take 5-6 hours. You are also given the choice between one or two students in your classes.

The Guild exists because many of the members volunteer to fill our various needs. This invitation is an opportunity for you to become involved in a very rewarding position. If you are interested, contact us! You will be glad you did.

T've been really looking forward to writing this newsletter article. At long last, I can give a preview of some of the classes the Guild has in store for next year. If there is a class that interests you, I recommend marking your calendar for when the enrollment opens. Frequently, classes fill up very quickly. Class announcements always happen on Tuesday nights at approximately 7 p.m.

Spoon Carving

I'm particularly excited to be able to announce this class. I've been working on getting this one set up since I became the Training Chair last spring. On Saturday, March 15, Jess Hirsch is coming from Minneapolis to teach her approach to spoon carving using traditional tools.

Jess Hirsch is a renowned woodworker and sculptor who focuses on a Scandinavian handicraft called *sloyd*. While developing her craft, she traveled to Sweden to study with Beth Moen and Stefan Norgaard through the American Scandinavian Foundation's Craft Grant. She was also the recipient of the Minnesota State Arts Board Folk and Traditional Art grant to study *sloyd* with Jim Sannerud. In addition, Jess is the founder of the Fireweed Community Woodshop. This woodshop focuses on empowering women and marginalized genders through the art of woodcraft. The goal of Fireweed is to reach out to those who have been historically excluded from woodshops and introduce them to the craft of woodworking. I feel extremely fortunate to have Jess teach at the Guild this spring.

The classes will be held on **Saturday**, **March 15**. There will be two half-

day sessions: one from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. and the other from 1-4 p.m. Enrollment for the class will open on **Tuesday**, **December 17 at 7 p.m.**

Basic Woodworking

The popular Basic Woodworking classes will return on Thursday nights next year.

Each class runs for ten weeks, and we intend to run three different sessions.

For those who are not familiar with this class, this course is designed to provide a basic introduction for adults with little or no prior experience with tools, materials, and woodworking machinery.

It is presented in 10 three-hour sessions beginning with a complete shop orientation and progressing through the planning and building of three projects.

The projects are geared to provide hands-on practice in:

- · Choosing materials
- · Preparing and joining wood parts
- · Cutting precise joints
- · Creating dado joints and grooves
- · Machining multiple component parts
- Mortise and Tenon joinery
- · Cross lapping
- · Gluing

The course ends with an overview of general furniture and cabinetry finishing processes, tips, and techniques.

This course is fast-paced, and students will be encouraged to use the Guild's Open Shop times for additional project completion time as needed.

Session 1: January 23-March 27, Thursdays, 7-10 p.m. This class was released on **December** 10 at 7 p.m. There may still be slots available.

Session 2: April 10-June 12, Thursdays, 7-10 p.m. This class opens for enrollment on February 25.

June 26-August 28, Thursdays, 7-10 p.m. This class opens for enrollment on May 13th.

Introduction to Hand Tools

Next year, we're going to offer two sessions of the popular Introduction to Hand Tools class. This class is designed to acquaint woodworkers with the use of classical hand tools such as planes, saws, chisels, and drills that were in common usage before the current power tool availability.

This type of woodworking is becoming increasingly popular due to nostalgia, but also due to smaller spaces to work and smaller budgets for buying very expensive powered machinery. Modern hand tools have been revived by manufacturers and the top-end ones, though expensive, are much better quality than the tools of our grandfathers. The student will learn the purpose, care, and use of a basic set of tools that will enable them to craft joinery projects from generally available materials.

Session 1: April 10-June 12, Thursdays, 7-10 p.m. This class opens for enrollment on **February 25**.

Session 2: September 11-November 13, Thursdays, 7-10 p.m. This class opens for enrollment on **July 29th**.

Intermediate Woodworking

Then, we're going to offer just one session of the Intermediate Woodworking class. The Intermediate Woodworking class is a *fast-paced* class that has been designed to be a continuation of the Basic Woodworking class. As such, it is required that students complete Basic Woodworking prior to taking this class. Intermediate woodworking

focuses on three elements in woodworking beyond the basic course:

- · Creating tapered legs
- · Constructing and fitting cabinet doors
- · Constructing and fitting drawers

These skills are taught as part of the construction of two projects, which allow students to continue honing techniques taught in the Basic Woodworking course. The first project is a Shaker Table and the second is a Wall Cabinet. Each project will be taught over a five-week period; however, students will need to spend time outside of class to complete the projects. There will be **less** stepby-step instruction in these classes with instruction emphasis placed on the newer techniques.

This class runs on Thursday nights, 7-10 p.m. **September 11-November 13**. It opens for enrollment on **July 29th**.

Mitered Picture Frames

Last, we are still offering project-based classes next year and the first one is the Mitered Picture Frame class. Students in this class will build two mitered picture frames: one 8x10 and one 5x7. The class will use a mitered sled on the table saw to cut the miters, a router table and/or table saw to cut the rabbets, and a router table to cut the decorative edges.

This class will take place on Saturday, **January 25th from 9 a.m.-2 p.m.** It opens for enrollment on **December 17th**.

Of course, this is just the tip of the iceberg in terms of what's in the works. Keep watching the Newsletter Training articles for a heads-up of what's to come!

DECEMBER 2024 - ROUTER SAFETY REVIEW

A router is basically a motor that turns a cutter head at very high speed. It is used to perform an extensive range of smooth finishing and decorative cuts.

Safety Rules

- 1. Use sharp bits, inspect them before each use, and handle them with care. Never use dull or damaged bits or bits with cracked carbide.
- 2. Consult a speed chart for the correct speed setting for the bit.
- 3. Use only bits that have a cutting diameter less than the opening in the router base.



- 4. Unplug the router when changing a bit.
- 5. When changing a router bit, insert the new bit as far into the collet as possible, then withdraw it about 3/16" before tightening the collet. Make sure that the bit shaft is engaged in the collet at least 1/2".
- 6. Always use the wrenches provided with the tool to make adjustments.
- 7. Be sure that the collet nut and any other adjustment devices are securely tightened before turning the router on. Loose adjustment devices can unexpectedly shift, causing loss of control; loose bits and collets may be thrown violently.
- 8. Make sure the work surface is free from nails, knots, and other foreign objects. Do not shape particleboard; it could fly apart while being routed.
- 9. Hold the workpiece securely in a vise or other clamping device. Holding the workpiece by hand is unstable and dangerous.
- 10. Follow the tool manufacturer's recommendation for the depth of cut.
- 11. Hold the router firmly with both hands. Motor torque can cause it to twist.
- 12. Feed the cut against the direction of bit rotation. Feeding the tool in the wrong direction causes the cutting edge of the bit to climb out of the workpiece and may cause loss of control.
- 13. Never lay the tool down until the motor and bit have come to a complete stop. The spinning bit can grab a surface and pull the tool out of your control.
- 14. Don't touch the bit immediately after use. It may be hot.
- 15. Return the bit to the bit holder located in the tool cabinet after use. Never store bits loose in a drawer.
