FROM THE SHOP

Stop! In the name of Love Before you hurt the Tool Think it O-O-ver

Thank Diana. Ι you. appreciate the sentiment. I happened to notice the tables of the mortising machines the other day. I went ahead and included pictures so you would see what I'm talking about. "When you make a through mortise, you are cutting a mortice through completely your material" (Captain **Obvious** 1986). I know this, and you know this. What may be getting lost is that the bit keeps cutting

after it penetrates through your piece. That is why when making a through mortise (by machine



or mallet and chisel) vou need to have a sacrificial board under your workpiece to allow for your material to be backed up to prevent tearout and to protect the

workbench/machine/ chisel when it comes through.

Now you're saying "Problem solved Chuck, the engineers at Powermatic are ahead of you and have mounted a layer of MDF on





the table of the mortiser, so we're done right?" Well, NO. The layer of MDF provided on the machine is to protect the bits from an accidental misjudgement of morticing depth keeping the bit from attempting to mortice cast iron (Spoiler alertthe bit loses). I suppose if you replaced the safety board after each use it would be ok but if you study the photos, that ain't happening. That board was placed there because sometimes mortises become through mortises by surprise, who knew?

In closing let me summarize When through morticing use a sacrificial spoil board to give you better results and leave the tools in good condition.

SAFETY ARTICLE

Happy New Year to all members of the Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild! I hope everyone enjoyed a rich, happy – and safe – holiday season. With 2025 now underway, from a safety perspective, there is a lot to look forward to in the new year.

In the December 2024 newsletter, I shared that 2024 was a significant year and thanked the many who supported the Guild's safety effort, especially getting me settled and more comfortable with guiding the KCWG Safety Program. Now that it is January, I thought it would be important to list some of the 2025 goals of the safety program. There is always some trepidation associated with



publicly committing to goals, I believe that it is always a good idea to put some navigational points out on the virtual horizon, so that we know where we're headed and we can chart progress along the journey.

Update the written description of the key elements of the KCWG's Safety Program Description

I have often heard the comment, "A written safety program doesn't really ensure the building of a strong safety culture."

While there is merit to this notion, I have always thought that an organization needs to develop – and revisit / refresh – an aspirational written document that describes the key elements of a strong safety culture and puts forward a strategic vision of the journey to achieve the overall goal of Zero Accidents in the shop. The current KCWG Safety Program Description is no longer accurate, containing names and contact information for individuals who no longer have direct responsibility for certain tasks and it references procedures and practices that are no longer followed. The goal is to complete the safety program update and communication of this document by the end of the first quarter of this year.

Complete the production of new safety videos

This has been high on the list of priorities for the safety committee for most of last year. At the outset of 2202 the Safety Committee identified the need for at least five new safety videos. Although we've made progress, there are still at least two more video productions that need to be completed – a handheld router safety video and a safety video related to use of the Guild's router tables. Work on completion of the script for the first of these two videos will begin during the first full week of January. We hope to plan for shooting video footage by the end of January or first of February.

Complete the revision of Safety Rules for the Shop

This was a focus throughout last year, but the completion of the final safety rules booklet still remains ahead of us. We hope to complete this project by the midpoint of 2025 or sooner.

Deliver AED / CPR training for Shop Foremen

Late last year we made progress on preparations to make this happen. A communication was sent to all Shop Foremen asking for feedback on the optimal days and timeslots that best fit their schedules so that we could confirm at least three separate sessions that would provide for enough options to accommodate everyone. The final schedule has yet to be locked down. This will be a challenge, but I am confident we can arrange enough sessions to meet everyone's first of second pick. More communication on this as developments unfold.

Shoring up Emergency Response and Life Safety procedures

We are working toward the goal of upgrading

the Guild's fire evacuation and severe weather procedures. To fully accomplish this goal, there will also be increased communication and dialog of the new procedures, so that we answer questions anyone related to the role of both the Shop Foreman and Guild members when it comes to above-referenced emergency response plans. We plan to complete this project by the end of the first quarter of the new year.

Campaign to recruit new Safety Champions

With the timely focus on Guild membership (recruiting new members and retention of the membership base) the Safety Committee is focusing on ways in which we can "grow" the number of Safety Champions – Guild members who are willing to step up and lead or support an effort to build the Guild's safety culture. We can always use another person or two to spend time as a member or advisor to the KCWG Safety Committee. We're also focusing on finding and developing additional trainers / teachers for Rough-to-Ready and, perhaps, leading Safety Orientation training. You or a member you know might be willing to explore some of the Safety Committee's ways of giving back to the Guild, send them in my direction. They can always reach me at <u>dir.safety@kcwg.net</u>.

No doubt other priorities will emerge this year that may compel us to re-evaluate the goals described above. No doubt, accomplishing the goals I have articulated will take longer than we anticipated to achieve. Remember, the KCWG Safety Program guides us to always look and move forward.

While their work schedules may not permit them to offer classes as often as I (or they) would like, I am grateful whenever they find it possible to share their talents and knowledge.

I'd also like to give a special shout-out to **George Rexroad**. George is always willing to offer a Scroll Saw class (and even an occasional Bandsaw Box class) whenever we can work it into his other volunteer activities at the Guild.

Last, I'd like to thank all of the people who provided a Skill Builder (or two) for the Guild this past year: **Chuck Saunders**, **Barbara Akers**, **John Johnson**, **Terry Johnson**, **Cal Hobbs**, **Craig Arnold**, **Tom Smoller**, and **Roland Mohler**. Skill Builders are great sessions that the guild offers free of charge (just about) every month. Truly, these sessions wouldn't happen without members coming forward to share their knowledge and talents.

The problem with creating a list like this is that, inevitably, I have left someone off. If so, I truly apologize. I would like to point out that without all these people who give their time to share their experience and skills, training would not happen. One of the things I love about the Guild is how willing people are to pass on what they've learned. For not being a woodworking school, I think our offerings are fairly robust. It seems to me that just about every month we have several offerings with even more on the horizon. If you have a class that

you'd like to teach, let me know. We'll try to work something out.

That said, there are a couple of classes that are opening up this month that I want to let you know about:

Introduction to Kumiko

This class is led by Wayne Peterson and is offered on **Sunday, February 9th, 9 a.m. – 2 p.m**. Kumiko involves making decorative patterns with thin strips of wood. It was traditionally used in Japanese Shoji (a screen or sliding door that can be used as a partition or wall). In this class, students will create a single Asa-no-ha pattern. Once the techniques are mastered, it opens the possibility of additional patterns and options to enhance your woodworking projects.

This class opens for enrollment on **January 14th** at 7 p.m.

Introduction to Scroll Saw

This class is led by George Rexroad and is offered on **Saturday, February 15, 9 a.m. – 1 p.m.** This class is a Basic introduction for the woodworker with no experience with scroll sawing. The students will learn the operation of the saw, safety considerations, blade selection, proper adjustment and tuning, material selection, and beginning project considerations. Each student will complete a basic project.

This class opens for enrollment on **January 21st** at 7 p.m.

Beginning Wood Inlay

This is another class led by Wayne Peterson and is offered on **Sunday, March 9th, 9 a.m. – 2 p.m.** This class is meant to be an introduction to some basic inlay techniques. It will consist of inlaying a straight border around a corner of a board and a 5-point star in the middle of the board (the star and border will be provided). The focus will be on hand work but some routing will be done for the bulk of the excavation.

This class opens for enrollment on **February 4th** at 7 p.m.

February Skill Builder

Finally, I'd like to point out a very special Skill Builder for February (**February 1st, 2-4 p.m.**). Last seen during the September Guild meeting, William Fehrenbach, also known as the Woodworking Minimalist, will be presenting Sugita's Woodworking Method to cut several different joints such as rabbet joints, mitered half lap, half lap, bridle joint, spline joint, and also a mortise and tenon joint.

As described in the book Woodworking Joinery by Hand — by Japanese Craftsman, Toyohisa Sugita — Sugita's Woodworking Method is a precision woodworking technique that uses jigs and magnetic sheets to guide and control a saw blade. This method allows beginners to learn advanced jointmaking techniques using only hand tools and can produce high-quality wooden joints.

This Skill Builder will be more in-depth and interactive than the Guild meeting presentation, so it will be an excellent time to become more knowledgeable about this approach to hand-tool woodworking.

As you can see, there is a lot going on at the Guild and training is just one part of all that is offered. Every time I'm at the Guild, I am reminded just how fortunate we are to have these resources, knowledge, and talents available to us in Kansas City.

It's a great time to be a member of the Guild.

JANUARY 2025 - SAFETY REVIEW BELT AND DISC SANDER

These sanders are for surface or edge sanding of nonmetallic materials only. They may be used for many types of rough end-grain sanding and simple shaping.

Safety Rules

1. Power driven sanders can cause serious abrasive skin burns from accidental contact



with the abrasive. Failure to keep your hands safely away from the abrasive may cause injury to the fingers and hands.

2. Before turning on the machine, check to make sure the sanding belt or disk is undamaged. Remove scrap pieces and other objects from the table, backstop and belt.

3. When you start a belt sander, make sure the belt tracks properly before beginning your sanding operation.

4. Keep the gap between the sander's table and the moving disk or belt as small as possible.

5. Be careful not to let the wood overheat. Sanding friction may burn the wood and damage or even destroy a belt.

6. Hold the workpiece firmly when sanding, and support the workpiece with the backstop or table or both. If your workpiece is too small to be safely supported, hold it in an appropriate jig or clamp.

7. Avoid awkward hand positions where a sudden slip could cause a hand to move into the sanding belt or disk.

8. When using a disk sander, hold the work firmly on the side of the table where the disk is rotating downward.

9. Do not push hard against the sanding medium. The sander performs best and most safely when it is allowed to remove material at a moderate rate.
