Enhance Your Safety Eyewear Experience with the RX-Safety.com App

Finding the perfect prescription safety glasses just got easier! The RX-Safety.com app is now available for download on your mobile device. Search for "rx-safety" in your app store. Install the app and Shop to your hearts content.

Accurate pupillary distance is crucial for ordering safety glasses. Several apps are available (search "pupil distance") to assist with this measurement. While these are typically paid apps (around \$2-\$3), they ensure accurate measurements for a proper fit. Simply download, follow the instructions, and use the results when placing your order.

Shop Enhancements: New Planer and Tenon Cutter

The shop has recently acquired a new Powermatic 18-inch 3-phase planer, We will be replacing the existing 15-inch Powermatic model. This heavyduty planer features a near-new helical cutter head for superior surface finishing and increased power. It will be operational shortly. Additionally, a tenon cutting machine is being acquired to streamline turf box order preparation. Delivery is expected before Wednesday's membership meeting.

Foremen are tasked with enforcing this rule, a responsibility they find challenging. Please prioritize safety and wear appropriate eye protection and other necessary PPE.

AED Update

The shop's AED is temporarily out of service. The Board of Directors is consulting legal counsel to ensure proper certification for AED operation. The AED will be returned to service as soon as all legal requirements are met and any deficiencies are addressed. This **Continued on Page 4**

This is an exciting month for Training at the Guild. We have a number of classes that will be opening for enrollment this month.

Garage Shop Income

First off, I am thrilled to announce that Stoane Loudenslager, of Wood and Stoane (<u>www.</u> <u>woodandstoane.com</u>) will be coming to the Guild courtesy of our friends at Woodcraft. Stoane will be teaching a couple of

classes at Woodcraft on April 11, and

they have arranged for him to come in early to provide a lecture on Garage Shop Income at the Guild on **April 10th**. Details are still being finalized, but space will be limited, and sign-ups will occur this month. Keep watching the Guild Classifieds and the Tuesday night class announcements for more information.

Project Finishing

The next session of Craig Arnold's popular Project Finishing class will be on **March 11, 12, and 13** (6:30-10 p.m.) It's good to keep in mind that building your project is only 90% of the work. The other 10% is putting on a good finish. One of the biggest challenges to achieving a good finish is choosing the finish you want for your project. To help you, Craig Arnold will be teaching this finishing class in three fast-paced class meetings that will provide you with experience finishing a variety of woods along with knowledge about various finishing materials and processes.

This class will open for enrollment on Tuesday, February 18th at 7 p.m.

In addition, I am pleased to announce future dates for Project Finishing for 2025:

June 10, 11 12, Tuesday-Thursday, 6:30-10 p.m. (enrollment opens on 4/29) September 23, 24, 25, Tuesday-Thursday, 6:30-10 p.m. (enrollment opens on 8/12) November 11, 12, 13, Tuesday-Thursday, 6:30-10 p.m. (enrollment opens on 9/30)

Shop Workbench

Over the course of two weekends, **April 5, 6, 12, and 13**, Kevin Thomas will once again offer his popular Shop Workbench class. The fundamental tool of any well-equipped shop is the workbench. Students in this class will build a Holtzapffel-style bench, a sturdy 2x6 foot bench complete with two vises. Not only is this workbench the heart of any woodshop, but it is also an heirloom piece to pass on to future generations of woodworkers.

This class will open for enrollment on **Tuesday**, **February 18th at 7 p.m.**

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Hand Tool Woodworking

The popular Hand Tool Woodworking class will also open for enrollment this month. Led by Dave Kraatz, Wayne Peterson, Richard DeWitt, Bruce Kunz, Steve Erickson, and Alex Bear, this class is designed to acquaint woodworkers with the use of classical hand tools such as planes, saws, chisels, and drills that were in common usage before the current power tool availability.

The class will meet over ten weeks on **Thursday nights (April 10 – June 12, 7-10 p.m.)** and will help students develop their skills with saws, chisels, and hand planes. In the process, students will build a Shaker-style bench.

This class will open for enrollment on **Tuesday**, **February 25th at 7 p.m.**

Basic Woodworking

Finally, the next session of Basic Woodworking will open for enrollment this month. This class will meet on **Thursday evenings**, **7-10 p.m. (April 10-June 12)**. The class is designed to provide a basic introduction for adults with little or no prior experience with tools, materials, and woodworking machinery. Over the course of ten weeks, students in the course will build three projects (a cutting board, a spice cabinet, and a plant stand) and will receive hands-on practice in:

- Choosing materials
- Preparing and joining wood parts
- Cutting precise joints
- Creating dado joints and grooves
- Machining multiple component parts
- Mortise and tenon joinery
- Cross lapping
- Gluing

This is a fast-paced course that provides students

with the basic knowledge and skills to build any number of woodworking projects.

This class will open for enrollment on **Tuesday**, **February 25th at 7 p.m.**

Skill Builders

In addition to classes, the Guild offers monthly free Skill Builder sessions on the first Saturday of every month. The Skill Builders are open to members and guests and no sign-up is needed.

If you missed the February session, William Fehrenbach presented Sugita's Woodworking Method. This approach to woodworking uses Japanese saws and jigs to create hand-cut joinery. I ampleased to announce that the session was recorded and can be viewed on YouTube (<u>https://www.youtube.com/@KansasCityWoodworkersGuild</u>).

We also have a couple of exciting Skill Builder sessions coming up. On **March 1, 2-4 p.m.**, Tom Vece is going to demonstrate his process for building wooden mugs. Then, on **April 5th, 2-4 p.m.**, Mike Blake is going to demonstrate slab flattening with the router.

As you can see, there is a lot going on with Training at the Guild. Registration for classes opens on Tuesdays at approximately 7 p.m. and tend to fill up very quickly. I recommend setting an alarm, especially if you have a class that you really want.

MESSAGE FROM THE SAFETY DIRECTOR

New Policy Updates – Running End-Grain Workpieces on Jointers and Planers

∎n December of last year, a member of the Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild (KCWG) suffered a severe injury on the 16-inch jointer. Two fingers on his left hand made contact with the jointer's cutting head. Fortunately, only the tips of his fingers were injured, but one of his fingers was partially amputated. The reality is that the injury was Members severe. of the KCWG Safety Committee conducted a formal investigation of the incident and briefed the KCWG Leadership Committee. The investigation revealed several

factors combined to cause

the accident. Because this type of incident impacts everyone who is a member of the Guild, this article provides a summary of the highlights of the critical causal factors of the accident and the corrective actions the Safety Committee is implementing to significantly reduce the likelihood that this type of accident will ever happen again.

The first critical causal factor of the accident involved the workpiece the Guild member was attempting to run through the jointer. It was a slab of rough-sawn wood that was actually a slice of a walnut tree trunk, incorporating the entire circumference of the trunk that had been cut away from the felled walnut tree using a chainsaw. Slices of tree trunk like this have earned the nickname, "Cookie" (because of their semi-round or elliptical shape; see photo below). The workpiece measured approximately $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches thick, was elliptical in shape, measuring approximately 221/4" long and about 13" at its widest point. He was attempting to make a light pass of the "cookie" through the jointer to achieve a smooth surface of one of the faces of the piece. In reality, this was an unacceptable practice as tree trunk slices or "cookies" like this are large-diameter workpieces made entirely of end grain. The Guild's Safety Rules for jointers state, "Always run wood through the jointer with the grain running parallel to the length of the jointer bed; never joint across the grain." In this instance, our investigation revealed that the Guild member's decision to run the tree trunk slice through the jointer was influenced by another - unidentified - member of the Guild, suggesting or advising him to run the cookie through the jointer. This was indeed problematic presence of the end grain was not recognized. The investigation brought to light that there is some confusion about what tree trunk slices actually are (e.g., end grain) and the wording of the current Safety Rule for jointers. However, when one takes a moment to evaluate the advisability of running what amounts to a large-diameter workpiece made entirely of end grain, it becomes clearer that this is not an acceptable practice. These types of workpieces are entirely end grain and are not safe to run across the cutting head of a jointer for two primary reasons:

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- Due to the typical shape of a tree trunk slice, or cookie, it is difficult to effectively support the workpiece on the vertical fence of the jointer. Experience has shown that cookies can twist or rotate as they are being run through the jointer. This makes the workpiece unstable. When the workpiece twists or moves as it runs across the cutting head, portions of the cutting head could become exposed as the worker is feeding the piece through the machine. We believe this is what happened as the injured Guild member was trying to run his workpiece.
- Because cookies are entirely end-grain slices of tree trunk, experience has demonstrated that portions of the workpiece can break apart while being passed through the jointer. This could potentially expose the operator's hands and fingers directly to the machine danger zone of concern – the cutting head.

Through discussions within the Safety Committee and Guild Leadership Team, it became clear that a similar risk is associated with running end-grain cutting boards through the jointer and running cookies or end-grain cutting boards through the thickness planers as well. Therefore, the corrective actions developed by the Safety Committee to address this risk is to clarify the existing Safety Rule for jointers to **prohibit** the running of tree trunk slices, or "cookies" and end-grain cutting boards through the jointer and thickness planers. This will be clearly and vigorously communicated to the Guild membership – especially to new members.

A second critical causal factor of the accident that was identified dealt with the condition of the push blocks that were staged throughout the shop. They had been worn or damaged such that they would not function effectively when using this machine. Additionally, there was a high likelihood that a second push stick was used – a narrow push design normally used for ripping narrow stock through the table saw. The corrective action implemented by the Safety Committee was to design and fabricate a more robust and effective type of push block for use at the jointers. We are in the process of fabricating several of these push blocks and plan to have an adequate supply of these on hand so that if one becomes worn or damaged, it can quickly be replaced. It is critically important that if anyone notices excessive wear or damage to the newly designed push block, DO NOT USE IT! Contact the Shop Foreman on duty and ask that a new push block be provided. Additionally, never use a push stick – such as would be used at the table saw – when running stock through the jointer.

This was a very unfortunate incident. The outcome of the injury was not as severe as could have occurred, but it was serious, nonetheless. The jointer is one of the powered woodworking machines that is both extremely powerful and useful but is also associated with high severity potential. Let's all keep these policy changes at the forefront of our awareness. Please remind all your friends or acquaintances at the Guild and make sure that we remain vigilant so we can avoid this type of incident in the future.

FEBRUARY LIBRARY NEWS



MINIATURE MUSEUM FIELD TRIP IN PLANNING STAGE

The Woodworkers' Guild is in the planning stages of a field trip to the Kansas City Miniature Museum, offering members a unique opportunity to explore intricate craftsmanship on a smaller scale. The Guild is coordinating a guided tour led by Bill Robertson, a recommended expert in the field.

Potential tour dates are being considered for the last weekend of March (Saturday and Sunday) and the first weekend of April (Saturday and Sunday). These dates align with the museum's availability, pending confirmation from Mr. Robertson. The tour is expected to last two hours, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

The museum's fees are structured based on visitor ages, with an estimated cost of around \$10 per person. The museum's Educational Director has suggested invoicing the Guild after the tours, allowing for a single payment. The club plans to set its own participation fee, potentially covering costs and offering a slight discount for members with the 20% Guild discount.

To ensure an optimal experience, the club will limit tour groups to 20 participants per date, although a maximum of 25 might be considered. The club is implementing a sign-up process to manage registration.

Organizers are exploring options for a pre-tour lunch gathering at nearby establishments such as Pizza 51 or the UMKC lunch room's food court. However, the Guild is also considering forgoing a group lunch to avoid potential scheduling conflicts and ensure timely arrival at the museum.

Further details will be announced once arrangements are finalized.

CAC SIG UPDATE The CAC special interest group (SIG) meets on The 3RD monday of each month at 5:30 pm in 2024

A word of caution to any Guild Members using the Internet for CNC training videos. DO NOT BELIEVE EVERYTHING YOU SEE.

I spend a considerable amount of time each week watching videos about CNC projects and techniques. There have been times I question the accuracy of what is being presented. This week, I was viewing a video where the presenter stated that up-cut and down-cut CNC bits will machine at different depths due to the mechanical forces on the bits. I found this hard to believe, since I had not experienced this in my use of the CNC. So, being curious, I ran a test on the Guild CNC, replicating the example he presented. What I found was that the depth of cut on our CNC varied by, at most, a few thousandths. In the video, he shows a variance of 45 thousandths of an inch.

Why the difference? I suspect the problem is not in the geometry of the CNC bits, but rather that the machine he was using was not properly maintained, or even worse, had not been designed and constructed with sufficient rigidity to withstand the normal forces produced by CNC bits. It should also be noted that the presenter, in the middle of this video, is advertising the line of CNC bits that he sells. Surprise! Surprise!

The lesson here is to be careful of the information being presented online, especially when a product is being touted.

The CNC SIG will meet Monday, February 17 at 6:30pm in the Guild Classroom.

As is customary, there will be a time for "Show and Tell" where anyone can share any projects, they have worked on that involved the CNC.

We will also have an open "Question and Answer" session where any topic related to the CNC or the software can be asked.

On the agenda for this month is a discussion of Online Resources available for learning the CNC Software.

The CNC SIG is open to any Guild Member and their guest.

FEBRUARY 2025 - MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW

HOLLOW CHISEL MORTISER

The hollow chisel mortiser is a specialized woodworking machine used to cut square or rectangular holes in a workpiece—most often to cut mortises for mortise and tenon joints. Similar to a drill press in many respects, it combines the cutting of a four-sided hollow chisel with the action of a drill bit in the center. The bit clears out most of the material to be removed, and the chisel ensures that the edges are square, straight, and clean.

Safety Rules

- 1. Turn the bit one complete revolution by hand before the power is turned on to make sure it doesn't bind.
- 2. Keep chisel and drill bits sharp and clean for the best and safest performance. Follow instructions for lubricating and changing accessories.
- 3. Make sure the workpiece is securely attached or clamped to the table. Never use your hand to hold the workpiece.



4. In cutting a mortise wider than the chisel, cut a hole at one end, then move the chisel past material about 2/3 size of the hole, and cut another hole. Continue in this manner until mortise length is achieved. Then go back to remove the material left between holes. Failure to follow this procedure will result in a ruined chisel and bit.
