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VP INFORMATION SERVICES SHOUTS OUT



FROM THE SHOP

Time for a review. In light of Mike Blake's Skill Builder on our new Slab Flattener this month it reminds me that maybe it's not just the new tools that we benefit from a refresher on tool operation.

Let me delve into the third leg of your woodworking experience.

Safety works to improve your woodworking by keeping your insides on the inside so you don't stain your project with that red people juice, and making sure you don't get a cool nickname like Stumpy, 3 Fingers, or One Eyed Frank. Training works to make the

wood you buy turn into the project you had in mind and not the best mulched garden while you stay warm in front of a roaring fire in the woodstove.

I'm here to speak for the tools. Those silent partners are there to help you realize your dreams with speed, precision and comfort. No longer do you have to rely upon erosion, animals and finding trees that grow in the shape of a Queen Anne Settee. Our tools at the Guild are handy to have, but they need to be used properly. When used improperly they wear out quickly or break (guaranteed to happen at the most inconvenient moment). Please make note of the following points so that our shop remains well equipped and ready to serve, OK Stumpy?

Drill Press – The drill press has a table that moves up and down, sure, we all know that. But did you know that the table clamps to the column to keep it from moving? It does, and before you move the table up or down you need to loosen the clamp BEFORE moving the table.

Tablesaw – The handwheels that raise or tilt the blade have a knob in the center of the wheel that keeps the setting from moving from where you set the blade. To lock the setting, turn the knob clockwise until you feel some resistance. Not until you can't turn the knob any further with all the strength you can muster as an Olympic weightlifter. When you go to make an adjustment, if the handwheel feels stiff to turn, check that the lock knob is not already tightened, don't just power through.

Festool Domino – Remember that the Domino joiner must be connected to a running shopvac when using. No shopvac and the chips don't exit the machine and moving parts can't move and then they break. That's bad.

Collets, arbor nuts, clamping screws and the like - Can you guess? Bingo, don't overtighten. Save your strong-man impersonation for the circus.

Stop Buttons – OK pay attention here, you may notice on some of the machinery the stop button is a larger button than the start button. Some of the machines will have a stop button and a larger red button usually labeled Emergency Stop. If the machine has a Stop button and an Emergency Stop button, use the stop button unless you are experiencing an emergency. An Emergency (by the way) is a condition where the machine needs to stop right now before you get seriously hurt. Not when you are done and just want to swat the button as you walk away. You will also notice that the big stop buttons stay depressed when you press them. If you read the writing on the button it says turn to release or will have arrows showing that you turn the knob to make it pop out. With a light touch you turn the button until it pops out, not until you unscrew the button from the control panel. Don't just pull the button out.

I hope you find this refresher useful and I speak for all the tools when I say "Take care of us, please."

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APRIL LIBRARY NEWS

Until the books have a call number, we will set them on the table in the corner of the Library. It is okay to look at them in the Library, but they are not ready to be checked out yet. After the call number is added and placed in the shelves they can be checked out.

The digital magazine archives can be accessed by clicking on the icons at the top of the desktop screen on the Library computer. The digital archives are not part of the online catalog and can only be viewed in the Library. Bring your thumb drive if you want to make a copy from the digital archive or copy a portion of a book or magazine using the scanner. There is a dvd player if you wish to look at one of the Guilds dvd's. (Note that two of the dvd drawers belong to the Turner's and are labeled as such.)


Items that are returned should be placed in the container marked "Returns" and we will check them back in and reshelve them. There is also a container for items to be reshelved.

LIFE SAFETY HIGHLIGHTS

The Kansas City Woodworkers' Guild Safety Committee continues to work to develop new programs or improve existing ones that positively impact members' safety. For this month's newsletter article, the focus is on life safety. Here are a couple of highlights:

CPR / AED Emergency Capability

We made mention of this late last year, but the Safety Committee's intent is to ensure KCWG Shop Foremen have the knowledge and skills to effectively respond to a true-life emergency involving cardiac arrest. While in the development phase, the committee experienced a few issues related to Missouri State law to work through, but at long last this effort is gaining momentum. Here are three important developments related to CPR / AED capability:

Training Shop Foremen – we will be scheduling three training sessions focusing on CPR / AED procedures. Based on polling of all Shop Foremen, we plan to hold a session on a Tuesday morning, another session on a Wednesday morning, and a third training session on a Saturday morning. This will likely take place later this month and will perhaps lapse into early May. Shop Foremen will be invited to select one of these training sessions to attend, based on their individual schedules.

Written Emergency Protocol Document – the KCWG Safety Committee has developed a formal set of policies and procedures to guide when and how the AED will be used, who will be qualified to use the AED, and how we would transition care to external Emergency Medical Services in an actual cardiac emergency. This document has been reviewed, and will be approved, by a licensed physician.

AED Service Contract – the Safety Committee has contracted with a reputable service provider to service our AED so that we can assure that it is always functional and ready for use in an emergency.

Although we all hope this type of emergency never occurs at the shop, the Safety Committee believes that KCWG is in the strongest position

when we're prepared and ready to respond if the need ever does arise.

Life Safety-Related Emergency Response Plans - Severe Weather and Fire Evacuation

Springtime in the Midwest is an amazing time of year. But it is also a time when communities begin to prepare for potential severe weather events such as severe thunderstorms and tornadic activity. The KCWG Safety Committee is currently developing formal severe weather response plans

for the Guild. These procedures will address monitoring NOAA and local weather forecasts / alerts and, if the circumstances dictate, to initiate procedures for "Shelter-in-Place" during a tornado warning and to issue an "All-Clear" when the Tornado warning is over.

Another critical emergency response procedure relates to evacuation of building occupants from the shop in the case of fire. The Safety Committee is developing basic procedures for how to respond if this type of emergency were to occur. These plans will cover notification procedures in the event of a fire, communicating the initiation of fire emergency evacuation procedures to members and visitors in the shop, and procedures for getting occupants out of the building and accounting for everyone so that we

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can assure that all persons working in and visiting the shop have made it out safely. In accordance with municipal fire codes, our new building has fire suppression sprinklers in place, so the likelihood of the need to evacuate in case of a fire is very low. However, as stated previously, the Safety Committee believes that KCWG is in the strongest position when we have plans in place, and we know how to properly respond in case of a fire emergency.

Once finalized, the procedures for severe weather and fire evacuation will need to be vigorously communicated to all members through a variety of avenues. As of the time this issue of the newsletter is published, the Safety Committee will have reviewed the Guild's emergency response procedures and will be very close to finalizing them. So, stay tuned for more details to come.

As always, I would like to thank the members of the Safety Committee for their continued commitment to members' safety and health; and the KCWG Board for their ongoing support of our effort by allocating the funds for us to implement the procedures that we feel are needed for us to implement effective life safety measures.

s I sit down to write this newsletter article, I have just spent the weekend in the Shop Workbench class. I can say from experience that workbench tops are extremely heavy! However, the Holtzapffel-style workbench is an excellent design, and Kevin Thomas does a very good job of providing instruction.

The workbench class is just one of many that we offer at the Guild. Here's what is upcoming.

Craftsman Clock:

If you've never taken Craig Arnold's Craftsman Clock class, you don't want to let the opportunity pass you by! This clock is a good example of the classic lines of the Arts & Crafts period. It incorporates a hand-made ceramic tile that reflects the traditional use of stylized tiles in Arts & Crafts design.

The clock maintains a traditional look and takes advantage of more modern conveniences. like a quartz clock movement. The clock is assembled with simple, but precise, mortise and tenon joinery and though screws are used to attach the top, the screw holes are hidden by square end-grain plugs.

This class provides an excellent opportunity to develop your skills by learning about some of the nuances of the Arts & Crafts design. At the same time, you'll end up making an heirloom-quality clock that will look good on any mantle.

The class is offered over 4 meetings: Monday, April 21, 6:30 pm – 10:00 pm (Hand Tool Room)

At the time I'm writing this, there are still slots available, but don't wait. Classes tend to fill up quickly.

Building Wooden Mugs:

In this hands-on class. Tom Vece will demonstrate how to craft beautiful and functional wooden mugs. Tom will guide students through every step of the process, from selecting the best wood to shaping and assembling the mugs. Tom will also provide instructions for applying epoxy, which makes the mugs functional (however, students will have to apply the epoxy on their own and away from the shop). Perfect for woodworkers of all levels, this class offers a chance to learn new skills while also learning how to create a unique, handcrafted item.

This class meets on May 17th and enrollment opened on April 8th. There may still be slots available.

Marquetry Panel:

In this hands-on three-day class, students will learn the intricate art of marquetry, focusing on scroll sawing, sand shading, and assembly techniques. Under the expert guidance of instructor David Roth, participants will create a

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beautiful marquetry panel, mastering the skills required to cut, shade, and piece together wood veneers. Whether you're a beginner or looking to refine your craft, this class offers a great opportunity to enhance your woodworking artistry.

The class is offered over 3 meetings: Friday, June 6, 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Saturday, June 7, 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Sunday, June 8, 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m.

This class opens for enrollment on **Tuesday**, April 29th at 7 p.m.

Project Finishing:

Building your project is 90% of the work. The other 10% is putting on a good finish. One of the biggest challenges in achieving a good finish is choosing the finish you want for your project. To help you, Craig Arnold will be teaching a finishing class in three fast-paced sessions that will provide you with experience finishing a variety of woods, finishing materials, and processes.

This is a fast-paced class. Students will learn techniques for finishing woods: Quarter sawn white oak, red oak, walnut, cherry, mahogany, curly maple, and pine.

The class is offered over 3 meetings: Tuesday, June 10, 6:30 pm – 10:00 pm Wednesday, June 11, 6:30 pm - 10:00 pm Thursday, June 12, 6:30 pm - 10:00 pm

This class opens for enrollment on **Tuesday**, April 29th at 7 p.m.

Bandsaw Box:

In our Rough-to-Ready classes, we introduce students to one type of box-making. class introduces students to another. In this beginner+ class, George Rexroad will guide students in creating a traditional bandsaw box.

In this two-session course, students will learn how to glue up a block of wood and transform it into a beautifully crafted box using the bandsaw. This class is an excellent opportunity to become more familiar with the bandsaw and expand your knowledge of what it can do. In addition, you'll come away with your very own unique box. Trust me—once you make one, you'll find yourself wanting to make more!

This class meets over two sessions: Thursday, June 19, 6-8 p.m. Saturday, June 21, 9 a.m.–1 p.m.

This class opens for enrollment on **Tuesday**, May 6th at 7 p.m.

Basic Woodworking:

Our last session of the year for the popular Basic Woodworking class will be offered starting June 26th and will go until August This 10-week course that meets on Thursdays, 7-10 p.m., is designed to provide a basic introduction for adults with little or no prior experience with tools, materials, and woodworking machinery. The class begins with a complete shop orientation and progresses through the planning and building of three projects: a cutting board, a spice rack, and a plant stand. Through this class, students will gain the skills and experience to build any number of different projects.

Enrollment for this class opens on **Tuesday**, May 13th at 7 p.m.

Knifemaking:

In this half-day class, led by Mike Jones, students will create a 6.5" chef's knife with a Damascus-style blade and an AUS 10 Stainless core. Mike will guide you through the process of fine-tuning the handle, ensuring you leave with a surgical-sharp, handcrafted knife. Whether you're a beginner or have some experience, this class will teach you how to construct

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handles for knife blades, resulting in a highperformance kitchen tool that's ready to use or provide as a gift.

This class meets on **Saturday**, **July 12**, **8 a.m.** - 1 p.m. and enrollment opens on Tuesday, May 27th at 7 p.m.

Skill Builders:

In addition to classes at the Guild, every month we provide a Skill Builder training session on the first Saturday from 2-4 p.m. These sessions are free both to members and to friends. It is a great opportunity to learn a bit more about the Guild while increasing your skills.

This last month, Mike Blake demonstrated the router jig that is available at the Guild for flattening slabs. He did an excellent job of presenting the various features of this jig as well as how to go about using it to flatten slabs (or cookies) using the router. If you were unable to attend, you'll be able to see the session on the Guild YouTube channel

Next month, Dave Kraatz is going to offer a Skill Builder on Assembling your Personal Toolkit. All of us who have had the pleasure to attend Dave Kraatz's class or Skill Builders in the past will tell you that this is **not** a session to miss! This session will be Saturday, May 3rd, 2-4 p.m.

In June, Chuck Saunders will demonstrate the Martin Saw again. For those who have missed the December session, you'll want to make sure you see this session. It will meet on Saturday, June 7th, 2-4 p.m.

APRIL 2025 - MACHINE SAFETY REVIEW

Sliding Compound Miter Saw

The miter saw is a power tool used to make quick, accurate crosscuts and miter cuts. A compound miter saw can make simultaneous miter and bevel cuts, and a sliding compound miter saw like the ones in the KCWG shop has rails for the motor head and blade to travel on to allow cuts in wider stock. This saw is often used to cut stock to rough length at the beginning of a project.



Safety Rules

- 1. Always hold the workpiece securely on the table and against the fence when making cuts. Where possible, use clamps to hold the workpiece in place—and always do so when cutting a workpiece so short that holding it would violate the 3-inch rule. Be aware of the risk of kickback.
- Support the end of a long workpiece at the same height as the saw table.
- 3. When cutting a cupped or bowed piece of stock, make sure the workpiece is oriented to leave no gap between it and the fence or the saw table at the point of the cut. If not, you risk pinching the blade and causing kickback.
- 4. Never reach under the saw blade or perform a cross-handed operation.
- 5. When you start the saw, allow the blade to reach full speed before cutting; do not force the blade and always start the cut gently.
- When using a sliding compound miter saw like the ones in the KCWG shop, make your cut in three steps:
 - a. First pull the motor head out.
 - b. Then start the saw.
 - c. Finally, push the blade down into the stock and towards fence to make the cut.
 - d. If your work piece is more than 1" thick, make multiple cutting passes to complete your crosscut.
- 7. Don't raise the motor head from the workpiece until the blade has come to a complete stop.
- 8. Never try to remove or clamp the workpiece to the saw while the blade is rotating.
- 9. When installing a blade, match the direction of the arrow on the blade with the direction of the arrow on the tool casting. The teeth at the bottom of the blade should point back toward the fence.
- 10. Use only blades with arbor holes that fit the arbor of the saw. Be sure the arbor nut is tight to prevent slipping or loosening of the blade.
- 11. Use sharp blades. A damaged or dull blade could throw teeth, causing serious injury. Make sure the blade is clean. Buildup on the surface of the blade will cause excessive friction.
